# A NEW PREMIER.

HON. H. R. EMMERSON SUCCEEDS HON. JAS. MITCHELL.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 29.—This afternoon the resignation of Hon James Mitchell, as premier and attorney general, was received and accepted by the lieutenant governor, who at once sent for Mr. Emmerson and entrusted him with the task of forming a new administration. Mr. Emmerson accepted the obligation, and to-night, at 7.30 met his honor at the executive council chamber and announced the personnel of his cabinet as follows:

- Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, premier and chief commissioner of public works.
  - Hon. Lemuel J. Tweedie, provincial secretary and president of executive council.
  - Hon. Albert S. White, attorney general.
  - Hon. James Mitchell, solicitor general.
  - Hon. Albert T. Dunn, surveyor general.
  - Hon. Charles H. Labillois, commissioner for agriculture.
  - Hon. L. P. Farris, without portfolio.
- The members of the new government, with the exception of the solicitor general, were immediately sworn into office. Mr. Mitchell will be sworn in early next week.
