## A Brutal Lynching

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 23.—Swift, vengeance was meted out Thursday to a man who made a terrible assault upon Mrs. Paulina Fenska, wife of Karl Fenska, a poor German farmer living in Leyden township, one mile from the village of Franklin Park. A party of infuriated farmers, armed with rifles, revolvers, pitchforks and other implements, started in pursuit of the man, who had fled from the lonely farmhouse into the nearby cornfield. The man, who is a stranger in the locality, and whose identity is still unknown, made a vicious fight for his life. He was armed with two huge revolvers and he fought his pursuers until his body was riddled with shot and he fell helpless to the ground. When this moment came the farmers acted like mad-men. They jumped upon the half unconscious wretch and almost tore his body to pieces. They kicked him, stamped upon him, beat him over the head with rakes, hoes, and rifle barrels and pinned him to the earth with the sharp tongs of the pitchforks. When they were through the man was little more than a mass of battered flesh and blood. His body contained a score of bullets and his head was beaten almost into a jelly.

## Wide Tires.

The following government notice signed by Chief Commissioner Emmerson and published in the Royal Gazette is of importance to many persons.

The attention of carriage manufacturers and of the public generally, is invited to the following provision contained in "The Highways Act, 1896":

## WIDE TIRES ON CERTAIN VEHICLES.

"(2) On and after the first day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, the wheels of every vehicle loaded with stone, gravel sand, or other material of any kind of nature whatsoever when the load exceeds in weight one and a half tons, shall, when used and passing over or along any Highway, be provided with tires not less than four inches wide. The owner or person in charge of any such vehicle, shall for every offence against this Section, incur a penalty of five dollars.

Preparation should be made by all interested, so as to conform to the requirements of this enactment.

## Sifton To Visit Dyea.

OTTAWA, Aug. 19.—Hon. Mr. Sifton is actively organizing the forces which are to carry out the government's plans in Yukon. He does not apprehend any insurmountable difficulty. The royalty on gold having been fixed it will be collected whether the miners are Americans or any other nationality. All will be compelled to obey the law. The minister was today in consultation with Major Walsh, administrator; Mr. White, controller mounted police; Deville, surveyor general and others. Mr. Sifton will go himself as far as Dyea and see the administrator over the summit. The party, which will include the minister, administrator, judge registrar, and others, will sail from Victoria in the government steamer Qudra, Sept. 26th.

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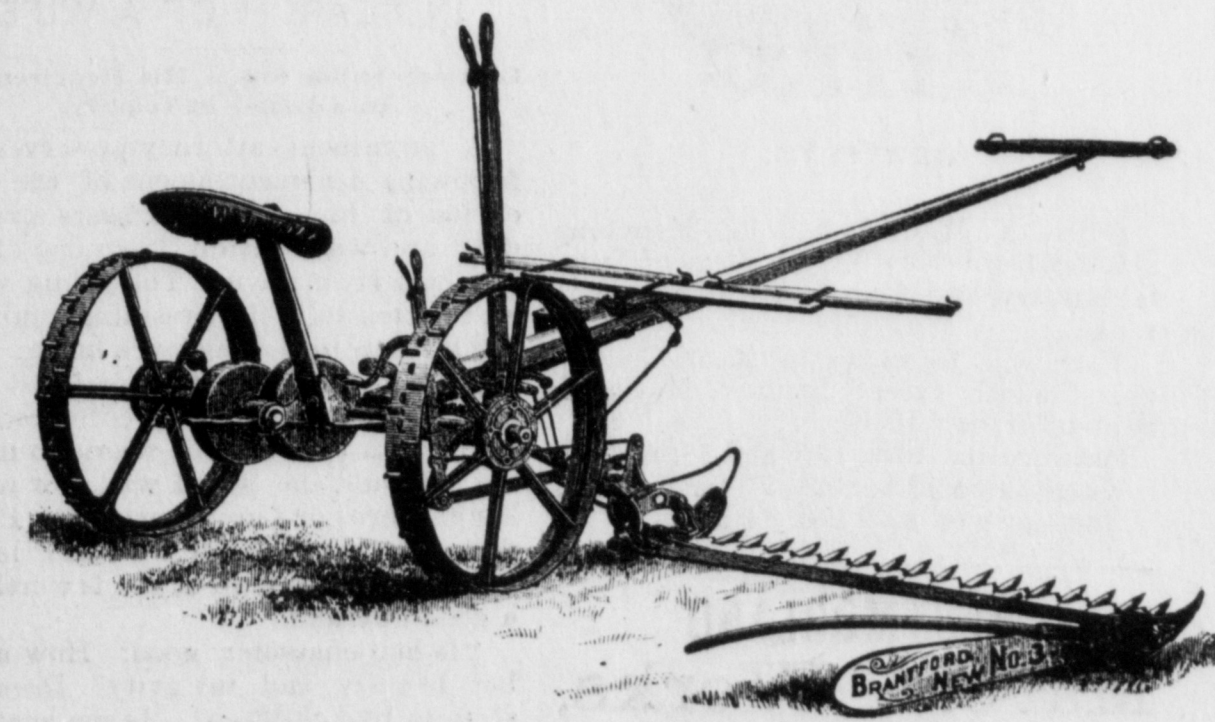
