TEACHERS' PARLIAMENT.

WESTMORLAND AND KENT INSTITUTES IN SESSION.

[Moneton Times-Friday.]

The united meeting of the Westmorland and Kent county teachers' institute opened in Victoria school hall at ten o'clock yesterday morning. The president of the Westmorland county teachers' institute, Mr. Frank Allan, A. M., occupied the chair, with Mr. W. M. Black secretary. Victoria hall was decorated with bunting for the occasion while the platform was adorned with a profusion of potted plants. Inspector Smith was present in the dual capacity of Inspector and president of the Kent county institute. Over 100 teachers were present when the president called the meeting to order, and this number was considerably augmented before the adjournment for dinner.

Messrs. Amos O'Bienes and Boyd Anderson were appointed to assist the secretary in the matter of enrollment.

The entertainment committee from the Moncton teachers consists of Messrs. S. W. Irons and W. W. Black.

Previous to the opening of the united institutes, the teachers of Kent held a meeting in Principal Irons' room for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year. Mr. W. A. Cowperthwaite, A. B., secretary, presided and there were about 20 teachers present. Inspector Smith was unanimously elected president and Miss Chrystal vice-president. Mr. W. A. Cowperthwaite was re-elected secretary, Members of executive-Miss N. Ferguson and Geo. Hutchinson. In his opening address to the united institutes of Westmorland and Kent, president Allan remarked that this was the first time that an institute from any other county had met with the Westmorland teachers, consequently this might be called an epoch in the bistory of the Westmorland institute. The teachers of Westmorland had looked forward with pleasure to meeting with the teachers of Kent county, especially so as the latter had had something to do with arranging the program. On behalf of the teachers of Westmorland president Allen extended a hearty welcome to the Kent county teachers institute. He hoped their first united meeting would result in lasting benefit and that this would not be the last time they would meet together.

Principal Oulton being called on expressed the pleasure afforded by the mingling of the teachers of the two counties. They were all glad to welcome the Kent county teachers among them.

Principal Irons made reference to the death of three of the oldest teachers of the Westmorland county institute, viz Messrs. Wilbur, Trites and Miss Foster. He moved seconded by Miss Brown, Moncton, that a committee be appointed to draw up an appropriate letter of condolence to be forwarded to friends and for publication in the press. This was carried and Messrs. Irons and Oulton, Moncton, and Miss Grierson, Dorchester, were appointed such committee.

The report of the financial secretary showed a balance of \$19 93 in the bank to the credit of the Westmorland institute, the receipts being \$39.28 and the expenditure \$19.35.

Boyd Anderson, auditor, reported accounts correct.

### PAPERS.

The first paper of the session was read by Miss Harriet Ramsay, of Kent county, whose subject was "Natural History." Miss Ramsay dealt with her subject at considerable length. She thought the proper method in teaching of this study was the cultivation of the observation of nature rather than the study of books. She took particular plants and animals as examples. The speaker thought there should be more field excursions where the children were brought in direct contact with nature. The paper was filled with information and interesting ideas.

Discussion on the paper was opened by Boyd Anderson.

W. W. Anderson, Moncton, continued the discussion on this paper and was followed by H. L. Brittain, of the Moncton High school. The discussion turned on the question of the advisability of recess being taken for excursions instead of being occupied by the children in play.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

Dr. Inch, Chief Superintendent of Education, was present at the afternoon

The discussion on Miss Ramsay's paper was continued by N. W. Brown, principal of the Dorchester schools.

Dr. Inch followed, dwelling on the importance of the study of natural history in the schools.

The institute next listened to an excellent paper on "English literature," by Miss Kate Willis, of Moncton. Miss Willis beheved that too little time was given to the study of English literature and the study of it needed no defence as sometimes did the study of Latin and Greek. There was no study that had a more elevating and refining influence than the study of good literature. The writer of the paper was also of the opinion that the real study of literature was delayed too long.

H. L. Brittain, A. B., of the Moncton High School, opened the discussion on this paper, dealing very ably with the subject. Mr. Brittain agreed with Miss Willis' paper, that the study of English literature should be confined to two or three authors.

R. D. Hanson, of Petitcodiac, and E. Estabrooks, of Sackville, differed from this idea and the discussion grew quite animated, Dr. Inch making an observation which called forth a brief reply from Mr.

W. A. Cowperthwaite, A B., of Kent, read an interesting paper on "Canadian history," which dealt with the progress of Canada particularly since confederation. The paper also criticized the new edition of Canadian history, pointing out what

N. W. Brown, A. B, of Dorchester, opened the discussion in an eloquent and exhaustive address on the importance of the true method of teaching history. The study of history should be to help estab lish a standard for life and citizenship. died. Secondly every lesson should have some point in it, to enable the pupil to draw the conclusion as to what has been the effect of a battle or the settlement of certain questions in history. Thirdly they did not sufficiently acquaint the pupils in regard to our public men. past and present. Patriotism could not b taught in a more effective way than by teaching Canadian history, and patriotism was the greatest prop that should be placed under our country.

Dr. Inch added a few remarks on the new adition of Canadian history, He said the new book had only come into his hands a week or two before the course of study was marked out and the plan for study arranged by the board of education His opinion was that the book was too large for the time given it in the cours of study at present and the board of education would have to reconsider that mat-

The president and Miss Mary Fawcett also spoke on Canadian history. S. W. Irons, Moncton, Miss Ramsay

and Geo. Hutchinson, Kent, were appoined a committee to draft the usual resolution passed at the close of the institute.

At the close of the afternoon session, the visiting teachers were entertained at tea by the Moncton teachers in the Vic-


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
