Father Mc-Pake, who was found murdered and robbed in the rear of the Academy of St. very low, and stocks large. The has given rise to some queer stories and set the tougues of the superstitious to wagging over weird theories. It is recalled that Father McPake was present at the execution of H. H. Holmes, the multimurderer, and his death is connected in a grusome manner with the baneful inflrences of the dead criminal by the credulous believers in such theories. Father McPake was a frequent visitor to the Moyamensing prison, and was one of the clergymen who attended the notorious murderer during his last days, and was in the procession when Holmes walked to the an unusually large number of the participants in the conviction of Holmes have suffered misfortune, and many see in Father McPake's end only another effect of Holmes's evil eye. Bliss, the foreman of the jury which convicted Holmes, was killed by contact with an electric light wire. Nearly everyone of the jurymen have suffered serious domestic or financial losses. The judges who presided at the trial were afterward overtaken with illness and confined to their beds for many weeks. Superintendent Perkins of Moyamensing prison, in whose charge Holmes was during his confinement, committed suicide. Assistant District Attorney Graham, who up to that time was one of the leaning men in Philadelphia, and was mentioned prominently for United States Senator, has met with reverses on all sides, and his name is now hardly mentioned in society politics. His assistant, George S. Barlow, spet t several weeks in bed, and his life was despaired of at one time.

SHEDIAC THIEVES ARRESTED.

Moncton, Nov. 13 -Officer P. J Sweeny, of Shediac, reached Moncton this morning with a young man named Bourque, whom he arrested on Wednes-Dr. A. H. 
