WEDDING BELLS AT COCAIGNE.—At the residence of the bride's parents, Cocaigne, N. B., on Wednesday, Nov. 3rd, at 8 o'clock, a. m., Miss Maie P., daughter of Bowen Smith, was married to Mr. Charles E. Lockhart, president of the firm of Lockhart & Louthes, Cocaigne. The Rev. Mr. Burt, of Shediac, tied the nuptial knot in the presence of about forty guests. The bride was prettily attired in a travelling suit of green cloth and carried a superb bouquet of chrysanthemums. She was assisted by her two sisters Misses Hattie and Jessie Smith who were attired in navy blue trimmed with white and white ribbon sashes. The groom was supported by his brother, Bert W. Lockhart, of East Liechester, N. S. The bridal party took the train for Halifax, where they will reside in Cocaigne, N. B. The bride received some very handsome and valuable presents, among them was a handsome gold watch and chain from the groom.

SCHOONER WRECKED AND ALL HANDS LOST.—In the severe storm, Tuesday night, or Wednesday morning, the Tignish schooner Janet A. was wrecked while trying to get into the river. She was first discovered on Wednesday off the southerly end of Fox Island, bottom up. Two bodies came ashore, and some women's clothing. One of the bodies was identified as that of Capt. Albert Gillis, son of Capt. Gillis of the St. Peter, who has a host of friends here, and the other was not recognized. A Tignish despatch says that there were three men and two women in the schooner. A Bay du Vin man says a live cow came ashore from the vessel and Mr. A. G. Williston also makes mention of this in his despatches. The Janet A. was a small vessel, formerly owned by the Messrs. Anderson of Church Pt. It is thought here that the Misses' Champion of Tignish, nieces of Mrs. Fred Jenkins, were on board the ill-fated schooner. An attempt to cut through the bottom of the schooner was made yesterday, but the waves were breaking against the wreck too violently for this to be done.—Chatham World.

A later despatch says: The schooner Janet A., from Tignish, was lost Tuesday night or Wednesday morning off Fox Island. She was loaded with oats and produce. Three men and two women were aboard. The bodies of Capt. Gillis, Susan Champion and an unknown man were brought to Chatham in Senator Snowball's steamer St. Isidore to-night. Capt. Gillis' watch was stopped at 6.30.

SUPREME COURT.—Amongst the Judgments delivered by the Supreme Court last Friday, was:—

Ex parte Martin Flanagan, in which the Rule for a certiorari was refused; and the Court holding that the Magistrate was not disqualified because of interest as a Ratepayer, as all Justices would be so disqualified and therefore all qualified; and that the alleged interest of the assistant inspector was too remote.

In ex parte James C. Thompson a Rule Nisi was granted for a certiorari to remove the conviction entered before Stipendiary Magistrate Davis.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13.—In view of the fact that the Supreme Court, which is now in session at Sacramento, will adjourn on Tuesday next until the second Monday in January it is not considered probable that W. H. T. Durrant, the murderer of Blanche Lamont and Minnie Williams, will expiate the crime for which he was sentenced to be hanged in December 1895 until the latter part of February or the beginning of March next. It is possible that the Attorney General will apply to the Supreme Court to advance the case, but this action is unlikely.
