

GERMAN INVENTS A GAS BURNER TO EMIT 1,500 CANDLE POWER.

NEW STATE OF MANHATTAN

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 11.-When the Legislature meets here one of the first bills introduced, says Assemblyman Patrick Trainor of the 13th district of New York city, will be one providing for creating a new state by permitting a constitutional amendment to be passed and approved by the United States government dividing 16 counties of the state and including them in what shall be known as the State of Manhattan.

The counties which it is proposed to set off are : New York, Kings, Queens, Richmond, Suffolk, Westchester, Orange, Putnam, Duchess, Columbia, Ulster, Greene, Rockland, Albany, Rensselaer, and part of Schaharie, to be formed into one state, with a population of 3,903,220, as compared with 2,631,123 for the 44 remaining counties. This would make the new state of Manhattan the second largest in the Union in regard to population, Pennsylvania alone exceeding it,




