

WEDDINGS

HYMENEAL.—The residence of Mr. T. N. Hyslop of 329 Cross Street, Malden, Mass., was on the evening of the 2nd inst., the scene of a very pleasant event, the occasion being the celebration of the nuptials of Mr. William Howard Anderson, second son of Mr. William Anderson, of Buctouche, N. B., and Miss Bessie Hyslop, only daughter of the late William Hyslop of Malden, also formerly of Buctouche. The ceremony though simple and pretty, was very impressively performed by the Rev. Mr. Perrin of South Boston. The happy couple were the recipients of a large number of wedding gifts including several pieces of plate of much artistic merit, and enjoy, very deservedly, the good wishes and esteem of a wide circle of friends and acquaintances, both in Malden and in New Brunswick.

DEATH OF MR. O'LEARY.—Mr. Henry O'Leary died at Dorchester early Sunday morning after an illness of about two weeks. His six sons, were at his bedside when he passed away. Mr. O'Leary was born in Bantry, County of Cork, Ireland, 61 years ago; he came to Richibucto when he was only nineteen years old. He engaged in fishing and by his energy and business foresight built up a very extensive lobster canning business. He also dealt in mackerel and other fish. At his death his estate was valued at over one hundred thousand dollars which has been about equally divided among his children. Mr. O'Leary was married twice: first to Miss Mary Brittain, by whom he had two sons and one daughter; and after to Miss Mary O'Leary, of St. John, by whom he had four sons. The latter lady died about seven months ago. The funeral which took place Tuesday morning from his late residence here, was one of the largest ever seen here. Pontifical High Mass was celebrated in St. Aloysius Church by His Lordship Bishop Rogers. The Deacon was Rev. A. Roy, C. S. C., Superior of St. Joseph's College and parish priest of Memramcook; Subdeacon, Rev. Edmund Pattencaude; Master of Ceremonies Rev. E. J. Bannon. The parish priest met the corpse at the door of the church and with the deacon, subdeacon, and quire performed the ceremonies of interment at the grave. Present in Sanctuary though somewhat late on account of the bad state of the roads were. Rev. Fathers Richard, of Rogersville, F. Babineau, of St. Ignace P. Belliveau, of Grand Digue, D. LeBlanc vicar, Buctouche. His Lordship preached an able and eloquent sermon. The pall bearers were Messrs. Wm. Hudson, Matrin Flanagan, Donnelly McDermott, Wilnot Brown, Rhoderic McDonald and Robert Phinney.

SUPREME COURT.—Kent County cases. Before the Supreme Court at Fredericton, last week, we observe the following cases: Ex parte Martin Phinagan. Mr. Phinney moved for a rule nisi for a certiorari to quash the conviction, on several grounds. The Court reserved judgment, which has not yet been delivered.

John H. Robichaud vs. Aimé B. LeBlanc. In this case the Defendant was convicted before the Stipendiary Magistrate for stealing trees off the Complainant's land. The parties are adjoining proprietors and the defendant contended that the dividing line being in dispute, the logs were taken off his own land and under a bona fide claim of right, and, the criminal intent being disproved, he was not liable to prosecution, and the conviction should be set aside. The case first came up on appeal before Judge Vanwart who, after argument, referred it to the Supreme Court, when it was argued by J. D. Phinney, Q. C., for the defendant and Mr. Vanwart, Q. C., for the complainant. The Court reserved judgment.

Ex parte Pascal Hebert. This was an application for mandamus to the License Commissioners, in which a Rule Nisi was granted last term. The Attorney General shewed cause against the Rule and Mr. Phinney, Q. C., supported it. The Court were of opinion that they were bound by the decision in Ex parte Mayberry and Rogers, decided last term after the Rule in this case was moved for, and that the Commissioners, having refused to consider the objection raised by themselves to the granting of a license, the application should be for an order to compel them to hear. They therefore discharged their Rule.

The Docket of causes before the Court is a long one, but the Court is rapidly disposing of the work. A number of Scott Act cases, in which the same points arise have been argued together while several cases have stood over until next term.
