TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—The united Institutes of Kent and Westmorland counties will hold their annual session at Victoria School building, Moncton, on Thursday and Friday Oct. 14th and 15th. It is expected that at least three hundred teachers will be present from the two counties. An interesting programme is in course of preparation.

CRUSHED TO DEATH.—John May, aged 16 years, son of Mr. John May, was crushed between two cars at Snowball's mill, Wednesday, and died Thursday morning. He was pushing an empty car, used in hauling refuse wood to the waste furnace, into the mill, when another car came down the incline from the furnace at high speed, unheard by him in consequence of the noise made by the machinery, and struck him in the back. There are no buffers on these cars, and he was crushed between them. No bones were broken but his internal injuries proved fatal. His remains were followed to the grave on Friday afternoon by a large number of men and boys.—Chatham World.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—About 7 o'clock Friday morning, the old Glendening house on the Buctouche road, Galloway, at present occupied by Bastian L. Richard, was struck by lightning. The family consists of Mr. and Mrs. Richard and seven children. They had just partaken of breakfast. Mr. Richard was sitting on a bench in the kitchen and had his youngest child, a boy of about five years old, on his knee. The lightning, it is thought, came down the old fashioned chimney and literally severed the woodshed from the kitchen to which it was attached. Mr. Richard was burned from the crown of the head down to the tips of his fingers. The hair on one side of his head was singed off and all down his arm and shoulder there was a burned streak. After striking Mr. Richard it passed through the bench on which he was sitting and killed a dog which was lying beneath the bench. A cat lying under the stove was killed and a pig lying in a pen about 40 feet distant met the same fate. Every member of the family was stunned and they cannot tell how long they lay unconscious. One girl about 14 years old, was also badly burned. Had the building taken fire they would no doubt have all been burned before neighbors would have noticed the fire. Splinters of wood from the building were carried two or three hundred yards away and scattered in all directions. There were two puncheons of pickled herring in the woodshed and the pickle in these was strewn over the whole building. The posts in the woodshed were shattered and on one side the shingles were stripped off in a solid sheet. The post against which Mr. Richard was sitting was much shattered and several panes of glass were broken. A large tin pan which had been hanging on the wall was knocked about the room and broken to pieces.

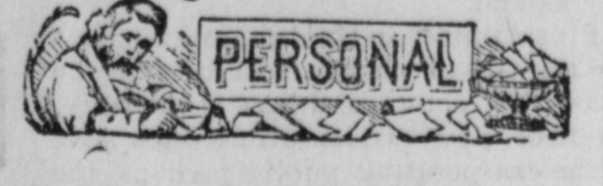
