The Kent Connty Sunday School Con vention was held in the Methodist church on Thursday and Friday, 9th and 10th inst. There was a good attendance of delegates, nine of whom were pastors. The sessions opened under the presidency of Rev. R. G. Vans. Recently the county secretary, Rev. F. Murray, has removed to Charlotte, and a temporary secretary was elected in the person of Miss Isabel Smith.

The parish work was well aiscussed, but some of the parish officer had not prespared a full report, this being the firs year of such request.

The convention rose to its climax in the afternoon session of the second day, when Normal Class and Primary work were the subjects discussed.

hev. W. R. Robertson, in a clear forceful way, opened the normal class discussion. He was followed by the field secretary who, by using the b ackboard, show ed the advantage of such studies to Bible students. Others followed and a deeper interest will result.

The county at present has no normal class, though some superintendents are using selections from the normal course as supplementary lessons in their school. Many questions were asked on this sub-Ject.

Miss Lucas' primary work in the several sessions was highly commended.

Because she felt afraid that the primary teachers were not asking as many questions as they must have in their mind, she accorded them an extra conference between sessions, which was gladly utilized.

A paper by Mr. Charles Main, on Grading Our Sunday Schools, was a very clear description of why and how this should be done. Such a paper would form an excellent leaflet for distribution on this subject. Others suggested that Mr. Main should be incorporated in the county executive, and his work be that of promoting the grading of Kent county Sunday school.

The opening half hours' praise, prayer and Bible reading were seasons of strength. The following are the officers for the ensuing year:

The new executive held its first meeting at the close of the fourth sessions of the convention, and the field secretary met with us and autlined systematic work

#### ON THE GRAND BANKS.

How the Cod and Halibut Are Taken by the Small Vessels.

Gustav Kobbe writes an article entitled "On the Grand Banks and Elsewhere' for St. Nicholas. Mr. Kobbe

The trawlers are generally found on he Grand banks, the hand liners on he western bank and Quiro. These and lines are smaller vessels with ewer dories, and the men fish with and lines, one man and two lines to a lory. The hand liner sits in the middle of his dory, with a compartment in itstern and another in its bow for his catch. When you see the bow sticking ar up in the air, you kow the fisherman has his stern load. Then, as fish after fish flashes into the other compartment. the bow settles, and when the dory i on an even keel the hand liner pull back to the vessel.

The trawlers bait with fresh herring. mackerel and squid, the hand liner with salt clams. The catch of both i split and salted, and the vessel has a iall "fare," or catch, when she has "wet her salt"-that is, used up al. her salt-and is full of fish. A trawler's voyage lasts about 8 weeks, a hand liner's 11.

A trawler's crew receives no wages, but fishes on shares. First the captain gets a percentage; of the remainder, one half goes to the vessel, which "finds"that is, supplies the gear, stores, sale and half the bait--and the other half to the captain and crew in equal shares which run from \$110 to \$150 and even

But among the hand liners each man is paid according to what he catches, the "fare" from each dory being weighed as it is taken aboard. This stimulates competition. There is judgment in knowing where to fish or how long to stay over a certain spot, and even th quickness with which a line is hauled in will make a perceptible difference at the end of a day's fishing. It means omething to be "high line," as they call the best fisherman, at the end of a voyage, and those who win this distincion time and again, as some do, beome known as "killers" and "big shermen."

The main catch on the banks is cod and halibut. There is also a fleet of anall American vessels which pursues to merry swordfish. Swordfishing is good sport-wheling on a small scale. A man, dart in hand, stands in the vessel's bow, supported by a semicircular | lines. on brace. When near enough to the h, he lets fly the dart. A swordfish ey weigh 850 pounds. One can tow a y a mile, and a piece of the sword s been found driven through the botom of a pilotboat.


