DEATH OF MR. WILSON.—Mr. John S. Wilson, one of the oldest and most respected residents of this town, died at his home about nine o'clock yesterday (Wednesday) morning, aged 83 years. Deceased was born in Colchester Co., N. S., but came to Richibucto over fifty years ago. He married Isabella Forster, of Galloway, who died about seventeen years ago. Two sons and one daughter survive him. They are David, of Victoria, B. C., George of Richibucto, and Mrs. James Frier, of Shediac. The funeral will take place at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon.

GREEN GOODS.—Referring to the green goods letters such as that given in our last week's issue, the Worcester, Mass., Spy says: A Spy reporter learned the names of several local business men who had received these letters. One of the gentlemen told the following story: "Some few months ago I received a letter from New York, wishing me to invest a few dollars in counterfeit money which had undergone inspection and even experts were unable to detect any defects. If I wished to enter the scheme I could send my name and would receive a sample of a \$1 bill, and then if I wished I could take it to a bank and have it examined, and then if I wished I could invest a few hundred dollars in the scheme and make several thousand dollars without being detected. But if I was not satisfied, I was begged to destroy the circular, as an intimate friend was connected with the swindlers."

TO OFFSET THE DEPARTMENT STORE.—Country merchants everywhere feel the keen competition of the department stores in the large cities. The people in many parts of Kent County have been in the habit for a long time of sending money to Toronto and other cities for goods which they might buy as cheaply at home, thus sending the money away that ought to be circulated at home. Our merchants themselves are a good deal to blame for this state of affairs. The following paragraph from the Dry Goods Economist gives some sensible advice as to how to counteract the evil: "There is no better way to offset the encroachment of the great department store than to employ its own methods wherever and whenever practicable. The retailer in the smaller town should keep up among his community a constant agitation as to the goods and values he is able to offer. Advertisements in the local newspapers within a reasonable radius, dainty or quaint circulars, business like catalogues and other forms of printers' ink should be constantly on the wing, placing the store and its contents, its methods and its values before every woman who can be expected to visit the city or town in which it is located. Samples may be sent occasionally or often, according to their cost."

KENT COUNTY PROBATE COURT.—The testaments in the estate of the late Henry O'Leary were granted on Tuesday to his executors, Messrs. G. V. McInerney, Richard O'Leary and Wm. O'Leary. The estate was probated at \$45,110, of which \$14,655, was personal and \$30,455, real estate. The will leaves \$500, to the Bishop of Chatham, \$500 to the R. C. Orphanage St. John, \$1000 for charities, \$100 per year to Miss Kate Brittain during her life. Mr. O'Leary's share of the general business, for the business had for some time been carried on in co-partnership between the deceased and his son Richard, is devised to his sons Richard and Frederick and the remainder of this estate about equally divided among all his children. On the same day letters of administration in the estate of Mary O'Leary, wife of Henry O'Leary, were granted to Richard O'Leary. Her estate is probated at \$41,500, of which \$14,500 was real and \$27,000 personal. A large part of this real estate is in Restigouche County.

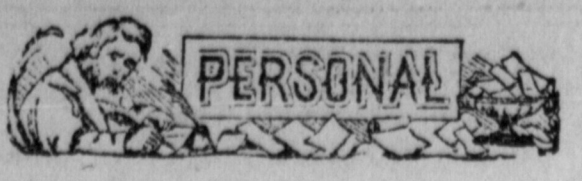
