#### SYDNEY COAL MINES.

THE CLOSING OF THE DOMINION COAL COM. PANY'S COLLIERIES

North Sydney Herald.

The Dominion Coal Company has officially notified its employees at Port Morien and Victoria mines that the collieries at those places are to be permanently closed on the 15th of December This official announcement, coming from the head office of the company in Boston and signed by the proper official, has created a sensation not only among the people of the districts directly interested but throughout the county. It has been the principal topic of conversation during the past eight days and in one of the districts -Victoria Mines-a meeting has been held protesting against the action of th company. Hon. HALIFAX. N. S., Nov. 16, 1897. H M Whitney, Esq..

President Dominion Coal Co.,

I understand that official notice has been given empioyees Victoria Mines, and mines are to be permanently closed On behalf of the government of Nova Scotia I protest against such action on the part of the company. This involves great loss of public and private property. Before would ask you to suspend decision for a short time, as I understand you have no advisers experienced in peculiarities of these areas.

G. H Murray. (Signed) To the above telegram Mr. Whitney has replied in effect, that he has wired Mr. W B. Ross, the solicitor of the company at Halifax to meet him (Premier Murray) and discuss the subject.
