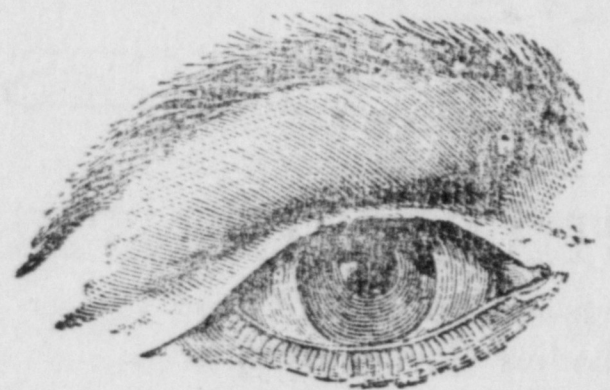

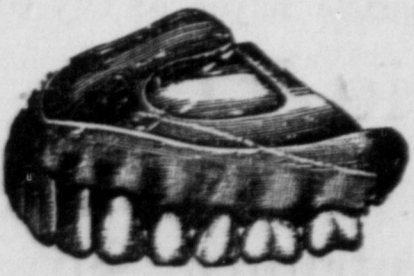

## TEN DOOMED TO DIE.

TEN OF ARROYO'S MURDERERS SENTENCED TO DEATH.

MEXICO, Nov. 26.—The great trial of Arroyo's murderers is over, terminating this evening with the sentence of death pronounced on ten of the police officials and policeman concerned in the butchery of the hapless wretch, whose attack on the President caused so profound a sensation here.

The jury was out for more than seven hours, returning its verdict at five P. M., and Judge Flores delivered his confirmation verdict at about eight o'clock. The prisoners stood by and the gendarmes presented arms during the deliverance.

The court room was crowded to its utmost capacity.

The closing scenes of the trial were most dramatic. Vilaviencio and Cabrero took the verdict coolly as in fact did all the prisoners. Bellido was sentenced to eleven months imprisonment and Crueller, who brought the knives at the order of his master, the late Inspector General Velasquez and also Bravo, were acquitted and sent free.

The Condemned men do not yet seem to realize their perilous position. Their lawyers entered an appeal in each case. Public opinion sustains the verdict.

## MILLIONS FOR A BOY.

SECOND SON OF HON. MR. MULLOCK TO GET \$10,000,000.

TORONTO, Nov. 26.—It was reported that the will of the late Mrs. Cawthra Murray was read at the residence after the funeral, and that the estate which probably aggregates five millions, goes, the great bulk of it, to Cawthra Mulock, a lad of 13 years or so, the second son of the Postmaster General. The money is to come to him when he is of age, and by that time the accumulations will probably make it ten millions. Mrs. Dr. Ryerson, a niece of Mrs. Cawthra Murray, it is said will get \$50,000 and so also her husband, Dr. Ryerson, \$50,000. The children of James Crowther, nephew of deceased, are to get \$50,000. Some of the servants get small legacies. It is not known that anything is left for charities. In case young Cawthra Mulock should not attain his majority the fortune left to him is to go to his father and mother.

When he had finished Lord Fitzgerald rang the bell and when the servants appeared said: "Tell Mary that the man has come about the coals."

## TWOPPENY LOVES.

NEW AND CHEAPER BREADMAKING  
METHODS.  
(London Mail.)

There is at present in course of erection at Putney an establishment for the manufacture of bread from unground wheat. In about a month from this date the public will be in a position to state its views with regard to the article.

The secretary of the company which has been formed to run the concern explained to a Daily Mail reporter yesterday a few things regarding this special treatment for the making of our daily bread.

"The process is simplicity itself. Instead of using flour, we take the wheat, soak it for about twenty-four hours, and then pass it through a mill. The result, as you will observe, is dough of precisely similar consistency to that of the ordinary article, only, of course, ours contains all the best properties of the grain.

"What we claim for it is that bread made of soaked wheat is more digestible and far more strengthening than the old article. Here are some loaves that were made in Brussels nearly three weeks ago; see how fresh and sweet they have kept."

That's another advantage claimed for the unground wheat. The question of cost is, of course, highly important, and when I tell you that we hope to sell our two pound loaf for 2d. or 2 1-2d., you will understand that the public is going to benefit considerably by the new process."

"But you don't suggest that if the scheme succeeds the occupation of the miller will be gone?"

"As far as brown bread is concerned, yes; but as we can't make white bread by the soaking process the miller will continue to exist. Meanwhile we are pushing forward our preparations for the bakery at Putney."

## DREW ON SIGHT.
