THE STOCK IMPORTATIONS.—Hon. L. P. Farris, C. H. Smith, M. P. P., and Thos. A. Peters, who were sent to the upper provinces by the local government to purchase cattle and sheep for New Brunswick, have completed their work. They bought 125 head of cattle and 160 sheep. The cattle are Hedsford, Holsteins, Durhams, Jerseys, Ayrshires and Lincolns. The Ayrshires were obtained in Quebec and the other cattle in Ontario. The sheep are chiefly Cotswolds, Shropshires, Dorset Horns and Leicesters and came from Ontario. There were ten carloads. The stock will be sold at auction.

The sale of thoroughbred stock by the provincial government will take place on the fair grounds at Fredericton on Thursday, Sept. 30. The stock is said to be remarkably fine.
