The latest developments in the use of waste is a scheme to produce hot water at a half penny per gallon from the waste heat of the street gas lamps. A machine for this purpose has been exhibited and appears to work effectively. The various parish authorities of the poorer district of London are considering its introduction into the streets.

The appalling number of cycling accidents is leading to the demand for legis. lation to abate the public danger. There were ten deaths and a score of dangerous injuries among bicycle riders during the first half of the present week.

The Paris municipal council is debating Mrs. Horard and three sons escaped. a scheme to furnish cheap baths in small buildings erected on the sidewalk.

The report of the asylum committees of the London county council shows there has been an alarming increase in lunacy during the last nine years, especially in London. While the population is 14 15 of the inhabitants of England, London's proportion of insane persons is 1878. Dr. Clyde Shaw, an expert on the suiject, says: "There is no doubt that, as regards the future of lunacy, we are doing all in our power not to stamp it out, but to increase it. This is largely due to the want of asylum accommodation, the technically cured being discharged before they are really cured, and thus adding further chances for the transmitting of lunacy.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 18.-A despatch from Tashkend, Asiatic Russia, ninety miles northwest of Khokan, announces that an earthquake shock there last night caused a panic among the inhabitants of that place. 


