THANKSGIVING SERVICE.—The Ladies Aid Society of Richibucto, gave the public a treat last Tuesday. Their Thanksgiving service which had been postponed on account of the mission services in the Episcopal church, was crowded. All the Vests numbers on the programme were good and well rendered. Fraser at not being able to attend was read by pastor Lawson. Mrs. Lawson's (president of society) chairman was remarked by all to have been perfect.

TEMPERANCE LECTURE. - On Tuesday evening, Rev. E. O. Taylor, the noted temperance orator, lectured in the Temperance Hall under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. A number of the prominent ladies of that organization occupied the platform. The lecturer was introduced by Mrs. H. A. Meek in a very neat and appropriate speech. The lecture, "That Boy of Yours," was highly instructive and entertaining. Although the reverend gentleman was in poor health, suffering from an attack of erysipelas in the face, he handled his subject with an ease that can only come from long practice. Yesterday evening the same gentleman delivered his lecture, "A Glass of Beer Analyzed." On both occasions large audiences were in attendance.

BURNED TO DEATH .- About three o'clock Monday morning fire was discovered in the dwelling of Mr. Peter Poirier, farmer, St. Louis. Mr. Aimie LeBlanc was the first to discover the fire but by the time the alarm could be given and the neighbors summoned, the house was in flames. Mr. Poirier, who was 74 years old, lived alone, being unmarried. The charred trunk of the unfortunate man was found in the ruins after the fire had burned itself out. It is supposed that a defective flue caused the fire. It was at first suspected that Mr. Poirier had some money and that robbery and incendiaryism had been committed, but this could hardly have been the case, for Mr. Poirier was a poor man. Three old coins (Spanish silver dollars) were found in the ruins. On Monday morning Coroner Thos. J. Bourque held an inquest when the following jurymen wese summoned: Mosie Barrieau, Dominic Babineau, P. L. Richard, Phil. Leger, Chas. Robicheaud, Levi Barricau and Sylvain Breau. A verdict of accidental death was rendered. The remains of the unfortunate man were interred at St. Louis on Tuesday.


