The escaped tramp was with them but took no hand in the assault. The men gave their names as Jas. Henderson, of Liverpool, Otta Highland, of Glasgow, and James Goulan, of Belfast, but Detective Skeffington has his suspicions that they are three dangerous tramp thieves whose head quarters are in Montreal. In conversation with the detective they admitted that they were in Bathurst last summer at the time White's store was broken into and burglarized. Detective Skeffington went to Harcourt yesterday and had warrants sworn out for the three before a magistrate at that place and they will be taken to Harcourt to-morrow where there trial will be commenced on Monday. The charge preferred against them by Conductor Heine is "assault with intent to do bodily harm."

The three men referred to were brought before stipendiary magistrate Bailey at Harcourt on Monday upon the charge of assaulting Conductor Heine, and attempting to do grevious bodily harm to him while in the dischaage of his duty as an Intercolonial Railway official, under section 263 of the Dominion criminal code, under the evidence of Conductor Heine, the Magistrate committed them for trial, and they were brought down to Richibucto via the Kent Northern Railway on Tuesday and lodged in goal by Arthur L. Jones of Amherst, an official of the I. C. R. who for that purpose was sworn in as a special constable of Kent County.





JOHN WALSH SENTENCED

SEVEN YEARS IN DORCHESTER PENITEN TIARY.

John Walsh, who was convicted on Saturday afternoon of manslaughter, was sentenced this morning by Judge McLeod to seven years imprisonment in Dorchester penitentiary. A large number of persons assembled in court to hear the

The judge's charge was brief and practical, and he did not keep the prisoner long in suspense of what his fate was to be. At ten o'clock sharp Judge McLeod took his seat, and after the roll of the grand jury had been called, the prisoner was brought into court and ordered to stand up. In his address Judge McLeod told the prisoner he had stood a fair trial and had been unable to clear himself. The verdict was one justified by the evidence, he said, and one in which he entirely concurred. He could give him a life sentence, but had taken into consideration the recommendation of the jury that mercy be extended to him For that reason he had resolved to give him a sentence so that when he was released from the penitentiary he would still be a young man in a position to begin life over again he hoped, with better results. The crime was a terrible one, taking the life of another, but he had considered that his influences had not been of the best and he would not impose as severe a sentence as he might have otherwise imposed. "The sentence is," concluded Judge McLeod, "that you be confined in Dorchester peni. tentiary for the peroid of seven years, and I hope that upon your release you will make every effort to atone for your past life, and redeem your character by living an industrious and sober life."

The prisoner took the result coolly, but his mother and sisters were greatly moved and Campbellton at 5.45.

A Lake of Ink.

In the midst of the 3,500 Cocopah

volcanoes of Arizona stands the lake of ink, into which run scores of streams of clear, hot, mineral charged water. It is only a quarter of a mile long by half as much wide, but no bottom has ever yet been found to its gloomy depths. The black water rises to within three or four inches of its level shores, and the temperature at the edge is 110 degrees F., rising at a depth of 250 feet to 216 degrees-4 degrees above boiling point. To the touch the water feels smooth and oily, and when it is in repose ashes and oily matter cover the surface half an inch thick. Although the water is jet black, it does not discolor the skin of a bather. The coloring matter seems to be held in suspension and will adhere to a white cloth dipped in the lake. To the taste the water is warm, salt and bitter.

To the bather the sensation is most delightful, exhilarating to such a degree that a bath of 15 minutes makes one feel as if under the influence of the

very best brandy. Millions of bubbles, formed by escaping gases, keep the surface at all times agitated, till it rolls, boils and foams as if ready to roll over its banks and escape. Whenever the neighboring volcanoes rage with anger, the lake follows suit, and the sight of its maddened waters will not soon be forgotten.

The cures wrought on the Indians who bathe there and on the few white men who have so far visited the spot are almost incredible. - London An-


