DROPPED DEAD .- William Lawton, one of Richibucto's oldest and most respected citizens dropped dead about 8.30 o'clock Monday morning while at work in Mr. R. Phinney's tin shop. Deceased gentleman was a native of Lancashire, Eng., and came to this country, about 50 years ago. He worked for a number of years in Kouchibouguac and then came to Richibucto where he has resided ever since. He was a tin-smith by trade, which he learned before he came to this country, and was working at that trade when he died. Deceased has always been in fairly good health, and has been working at times for Mr. Phinney for a number of Monday morning he got up at his usua he and ate a hearty breakfast after which he went to work and about an hour and a half afterwards was taken home dead. Heart failure was supposed to have been the cause of death. He leaves surviving a wife and three children, two daughters and one son. The daughters are Mrs. David Thompson, who resides here and Mrs. Alex. McDonald, living in the United States. Edward, the only son, also resides here. Deceased was 79 years of age. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at two o'clock in the Episcopal burying ground and was largely attended. Rev. H. A. Meek officiated.






