THE THELMA'S CREW.—Mate Madision and ten of the crew of the Norwegian bark Thelma, which was wrecked near Buctouche, arrived in Halifax, Tuesday, en route to Liverpool. The Thelma was sailing from Londonderry to Miramichi in ballast and in a furious hurricane and sprang a leak and ran ashore on the night of Nov. 12th. The vessel listed to starboard and held fast a vessel's length from the shore, but owing to the heavy sea the crew were not able to get ashore until Monday afternoon. Sunday was intensely cold and the spray froze on the deck, adding to the discomfort and hardship of the men. The crew are being sent home on the steamer Ulunda by I. H. Matthers, the Norwegian consul at Halifax. The Thelma was owned in Miramichi but sailed under the Norwegian flag.—Times.

—The sch. Polar Star sailed from here on Saturday, she was loaded with lumber by J. & T. Jardine for Glace Bay, C. B. The schooners, Maggie Roach and Ella Maud arrived here yesterday, both had small cargoes of merchandise. The sch. Morning Star is expected from Pictou. She will be the last vessel to enter this year.

—George Black and George Amiraux left Skagway for home on the 6th, of November. They were the last of the Geo Black party to leave the Klondyke; Body, Graham, Pinder and Hoskins having arrived home over a month ago. The party will return to the Yukon probably about the last of February to work the claims they have secured. Geo Amiraux will be warmly welcomed home by the Richibucto boys, who are anxious to hear of his many adventures in the gold country.
