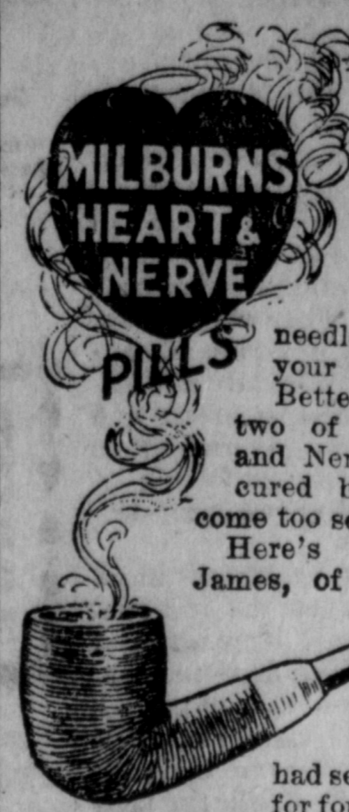

The Lake Erie is the first of three magnificent twin screw passenger steamers of 10,000 tons each which Messrs. Elder Dempster & Co., have contracted for to be placed next season on the route between Montreal and Liverpool.

Maine has 30 pulp and 28 paper mills, employing nearly 6000 operators who receive about \$5,000,000 yearly in wages. The cost of the wood consumed yearly is not less than \$2,500,000. There are produced daily in the state 600 tons of paper, 735 tons of ground wood pulp, 330 tons of sulphite pulp, 110 tons of soda pulp, and 60 tons of leather board, a total of 550,500 tons yearly. The capital invested and about to be invested in the pulp and paper industry in the state amounts to \$30,000,000 and the product at present amounts to \$17,916,06 annually.

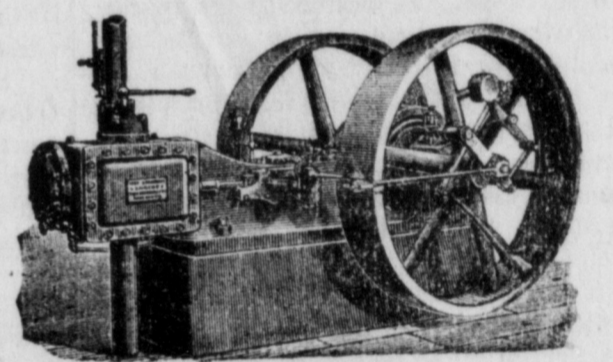

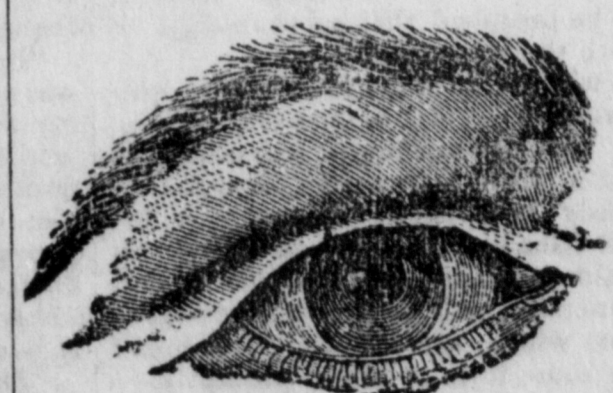
