Fire broke out in the Webster House near Buaventure station, Montreal, about 4 o'clock Tuesday morning and gained considerable headway before being discovered. Three firemen were killed, five guests are dead from suffocation, and twenty-five guests, mostly permanent boarders, cannot be accounted for.

The customs revenue of the Dominion continues to increase. The returns for the month of October, which ended Tuesday shows an increase of nearly half a million dollars over October last year. The figures are \$2,460,010, as against \$1,993,271 for October, 1898. This makes an increase of nearly one million dollars for the fiscal year so far.

The Sackville Post says: "Mr. Jos A. McQueen informs the Post that he has not solicited but has been informally tendered the office of Sheriff, and that he purposes accepting it. In doing so he declares it understood that he intends to cut himself clear from all political action in parties or factions. He stated that he intended to administer the office judicially and independently, and free from all previous political connections and alliances. He was now out of politics."

Fredericton Gleaner: Messrs. George Pinder and William Buddy arrived here upon the noon C. P. R. express to-day from the Klondike, where they went in the spring of 1897 with the George Black party. They have had a variety of experiences and are hale and hearty and in good spirits after their long and novel trip. Messrs. George Black and George Amireaux, the two other members of the party who are still at Dawson, will likely come home this fall and the whole party will return to the Klondike next February.
