### JOHN WESLEY ON THE DRINK CURSE.

John Wesley, in preparing the general rules for his societies as early as 1743 included one prohibiting "buying or selling spirituous liquors or drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity." He not only prepared this rule, but enforced one of his societies seventeen members for drinking and two for retailing spirituous liquors.

Wesley was outspoken on the subject in his pulpit. In his sermon on "The Use of Money," in 1760, he used these words:

"Neither may we hurt our neighbour in his body; therefore, we may not sell anything which tends to impair health. Such is, eminently, all that liquid fire commonly called drams, or spirituous liquors. It is true these may have a place in medicine, although there would rarely be occasion for them, were it not for the unskillfulness of the practitioner; therefore, such as prepare and sell them only for this end may keep their conscience clear. . . . But all who sell them in the common way to any that will buy are poisoners-general. They murder his Majesty's subjects by wholesale, neither does their eye pity or spare. They drive them to hell like sheep; and what is their gain? Is it not the blood of these men? Who, then, would envy their large estates and sumptuous palaces? A curse is in the midst of them; the curse of God cleaves to the stones, the timber, the furniture of them. The curse of God is in their gardens, their walk, their groves, a fire that burns to the nethermost hell. Blood, blood is there; the foundation, the floor, the walls, the roof, are stained with blood! And canst thou hope, O thou man of blood! though thou art clothed in scarlet and fare sumptuously every day—canst thou hope to deliver down thy fields of blood to the third generation? Not so, for there is a God in heaven; therefore thy name shall soon be rooted out."

### DRINK AND INSANITY.

Temperance statistics have often been ridiculed, but it is quite easy to get accurate statistics on some of the bad effects of the liquor traffic as upon any other subject. Nobody will dispute figures prepared by Dr. Daniel Clarke, superintendent of the lunatic asylum in Toronto. Dr. Clarke testified before the Commission that out of 6,000 cases of insanity he had examined, 91 per cent. were produced by drink. In round numbers, one lunatic in every ten was made a lunatic by liquor. That means that there are seventy human beings in the Toronto asylum who lost their reason by drink, and a proportionate number in the Kingston, Hamilton, and London asylums. But that is not all. As Dr. Clarke testified, insanity is often produced by combined causes. The drink habit may combine with domestic trouble, business trouble, worry, overwork, or any other of the exciting causes that make lunatics. It is the sole or main cause of insanity in one case out of every ten, and a contributing cause in many others. There, then, we have an awful fact made clear, and that, too, by one of the most

distinguished specialists on the continent. The next time you pass the Toronto asylum, just remember that one in every ten of the creatures behind those walls, bereft of God's highest gift, was put there by drink.

### THE CIGARETTE EVIL.

Just now attention is being directed to the poisonous results of cigarette smoking, especially among boys. Now, it seems to me that if the matter was better understood there would be more earnest and concerted action in the way of suppressive measures. As I am on the road much of my time an opportunity is thus afforded of noticing how the habit is growing in strength. Again and again I have seen groups of boys going to and from the various High Schools on the trains, and many of them lighting cigarette after cigarette, whose parents were doubtless in ignorance of what they were doing. On one occasion recently a conductor called my attention to such a group, and incidentally mentioned his own experience. His boy came home from school showing repeatedly such signs of nervous excitement that he and the mother were convinced that it was the result of over study, and a physician was consulted. Imagine the surprise of the family on being informed that the lad was the victim of cigarette poisoning, and that his health would be ruined unless the habit could be overcome at once.

And that young men are also exposed to the danger can be easily ascertained, but the difficulty lies in the fact that one cannot convince them of their danger. One morning recently I saw a young man who had almost lost control of his muscles. He got up early from his berth on a sleeper and while dressing, and even in the wash room, he kept a cigarette lighted, so as to avail himself of every moment. When he registered at the Windsor, in Montreal, a few minutes afterwards his signature could scarcely be deciphered in consequence of his inability to hold the pen firmly.

Inasmuch as the Globe has the reputation of being on the right side of religious and moral questions, would it be too much to express the hope that its powerful influence for good may now be exerted in favour of those who realize the awful danger to which the youths of our country are exposed.—Toronto Globe.

### NOTES OF THE WAR.

KNOWN IN FREDERICTON.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 31.—A prominent officer of No. 4, R. R. C. I., reports that Lieut. M. J. Furnell, who came to Fredericton from Halifax and took a course of instruction at the Infantry School here three years ago, was among the officers of the Royal Irish Fusiliers regiment which was caught in the hills near Ladysmith and surrendered to the Boers yesterday. Lieut. Furnell went to Ireland soon after his departure, and succeeded through the influence of his father, who is a colonel in the British army, in obtaining a commission in the Imperial service. He made many friends during his stay in Fredericton.

TO SHELL KIMBERLEY.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 31.—It is reported from Berkeley West that the Boers are constructing forts around Kimberley for the purpose of shelling the town.

### THE ROUTE OF THE ARMY CORPS.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—As reinforcements will arrive each day at Cape Town, Gen. Buller ought to be in a position very soon to send troops to the relief of Mafeking and Kimberley without depleting the strength of the great army corps which will make a grand parade through Cape Colony and the Orange Free State to Pretoria.

Although no announcements are yet officially made as to the destination and movement of the army corps, it is said that the troops will be conveyed by rail to De Aar Junction at least, if stations further north are by that time inaccessible and will hence proceed northward by forced marches to Bloemfontein and the Transvaal. Military men regard the hostile attitude of the Free State as a blessing in disguise, owing to the flatness of the country and the difficulty of defending it against an officer of Buller's capacity and strength of forces. The Free State is not an ideal base for a satisfactory invasion of the Transvaal, but will serve military requirements much better than northern Natal.
