THE LATE WILLIAM EDDY.—The death occurred last Wednesday morning of William Eddy, one of Kingston's oldest and most respected citizens. Deceased gentleman was 75 years of age, and was a native of Palmouth, Cornwall, England, and came to this country in 1840. He worked for a number of years in Gloucester county and then came to Chatham, N. B. After working in Chatham for a short time he came to Richibucto and then went to Kingston where he has resided ever since. He was a shipcarpenter by trade and worked for the firm of J. & T. Jardine until that firm gave up shipbuilding. Deceased was in fairly good health until within a short time of his death. He had been living with relatives in Galloway until a few days before his death when he was removed to Jardineville to the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. William Scott, where he died. He was especially recognized as a man of sterling integrity of character, a kind friend, an indulgent parent and above all a true and devoted Christian. The large concourse of mourning people that attended his last obsequies, bore ample testimony to the esteem in which he was universally held. He had no enemies for he deserved none, and having lived in peace with all mankind he passed away surrounded by weeping and sorrowing relatives and friends to dwell for ever in peace with his God. He leaves surviving him three sons and two daughters. The sons are Thomas, George and James, all of whom reside in the United States, and the daughters are, Mary, wife of Mr. Edward Scott, of Moncton, and Janet, wife of Mr. William Scott, of Jardineville. The funeral took place last Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Presbyterian burying ground at Kingston and was largely attended. Rev. D. Fraser conducted the services at the house and grave. The pall bearers were: Edward and William Scott, Edward Smith, John Jardine, George Eddy and George Scott.

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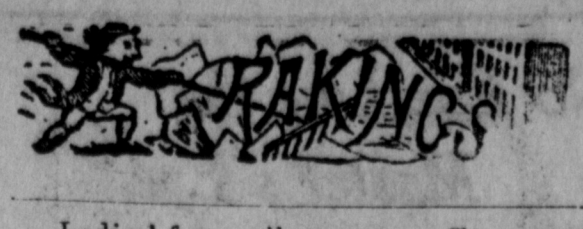
