—Tug Frederick A. left here yesterday morning with four scows and tug Alcyone for Cape Breton. It is the intention of the owners of tug Alcyone to have a new propeller put on her at Pictou.

—A Harvest Thanksgiving service will be held in St. Mary's Church Richibucto, on Wednesday Oct. 11th. Rev. J. deSoyres, M. A., of St. John, will preach. He will also deliver a lecture on the following day.

—Last Wednesday afternoon one of the heaviest gales of wind of the season set in and continued until Thursday evening. During the gale several fishing boats were driven ashore at the South beach, but were not damaged to any extent. There was considerable damage done to the fisheries along the coast. Pilot Wm. Long lost part of the main boom of his schooner in trying to board the steamship Bentala.

—The steamship Bentala arrived outside the harbour from New York last Wednesday morning, but owing to the north west wind which prevailed she was unable to come into port until Friday afternoon when she was brought in by the tug Calluna. The Bentala is the first steamship that has visited Richibucto. She is loading lumber at Kingston for Messrs J. & T. Jardine which will be taken to Liverpool, Eng. She carries about 1000 standard of deals and her net tonnage is 1,793. She belongs to Glasgow, Scotland. On Sunday afternoon people from all parts of the county visited Kingston for the purpose of examining the Bentala.
