DIED IN VANCOUVER .- Mr. Robert Brown, formerly of Bass River, and well known throughout Kent County, died in Vancouver, B. C., on Nov. 26th. The late Mr. Brown was born in Edinborough in 1819, and came to Richibucto about 60 years ago. He was for a time employed with J. W. Holderness and others in ship building, and later started business for himself at Bass River. The Weldford, Walter J. Cumming, Annie Wark, M. A. Forbes, Annie Brown, Aphor, Katie Irving, Martha Reed and Jessie Renwick were some of the principal ships built by him. In 1881, ship building in this country being no longer a profitable industry, he removed to Vancouver where he superintended the building of the steam ship Queen City and others. He married Miss Dergarvel, of Molus River, who died some years before he removed to Vancouver. He leaves four sons: James of Atlin City, John of Brandon, Robert of Boston, and William of Vancouver, and five daughters; Mrs. E. B. Buckerfield of Harcourt, Mrs. McIntosh of Victoria, Mrs. Dickinson, Mrs. John Boyd and Miss Mary Brown of Vancouver.

HEIR TO AN ESTATE.-Who and where is John W. Murphy? In far-off New Brunswick he is wanted to receive a portion of an estate left him by a deceased sister. According to a letter received by Attorney Geo. B. Winston from E. Girouard, a barrister of Moncton, N. 




Wood's Phosphodine is sald in Richibucto by Fstate W. W. Short.


