**THE KHALIFA KILLED IN BATTLE.**

CAIRO.—The Khalifa has been killed in battle. Lork Cromer, the British minister here, has received the following despatch from General Kitchener: "Wingate's force came up with the Kalifa's force seven miles south east of Godid and attacked it. After a sharp fight we took his position. The Khalifa, who was surrounded by a bodyguard of Emirs, was killed, and all the principal Emirs were killed or captured except Osman Digna who escaped. The Dervishes were utterly defeated. Their whole camp was taken and thousands surrendered. A large number of women, children and artile fell into the hands of the Anglo-Egyptian force. The Khalifa referred to as being killed in battle is Abdullah El Taishi, the great chieftain of the Soudan, who has given the British so much trouble. It may be said that the power of the Dervishes is probably crushed. He was one of the three Khalifas who in 1884 helped the famous Madhi to overthrow the government of Egypt in Eastern Soudan and establish this despotism of the Madhi in its place.

**EX-CONVICT INHERITS AN IMMENSE FORTUNE.**

LONDON, Nov. 29.—George Barker Cooper, who was in 1892 sentenced to ten years' imprisonment for killing his wife at Douglas, Isle of Man—a crime which produced a sensational trial—has just been released. He finds awaiting him a fortune which is estimated at £1,000,000. Cooper, whose father was one of the richest men in the County Palatine, in September, 1891, married, at Chester, a Miss Edith Cooper, the daughter of another wealthy man. Twelve months later the wife was found dead, stabbed to the heart in the rooms the couple occupied at a Douglas Hotel. The husband when arrested, affirmed that he was cutting his nails with a penknife when his wife fainted suddenly, falling on the blade and causing her death.

After seven days' trial the prisoner was found guilty of manslaughter. Both Cooper's father and father-in-law were however, convinced of his innocence, and died leaving him their respective fortunes, which are said to make him a millionaire. The released man intends settling in the colonies.

**TIMID AND WEAK MEN.**

"The one individual who is not entitled to exist in a community like ours, is the timid good man." This remark was made by Governor Roosevelt in Ocean Grove. He also states that political and social evil will prevail until good decent men arise and change them. Of him Frederick Harrison says he was the "ruler into whose presence no vicious man could ever come; whose service no vicious man might enter."

It has been said that a weak man is worse than a wicked man, and no doubt moral weakness in a man or in a government, if not wickedness in itself, often permits wickedness to exist and evil to live and thrive. A man of a people need to be really strong and courageous as well as good; for virtue then becomes a mighty force. It is possible for us to be too easy and two considerate towards individual and corporate vices.

Evils will exist and wickedness will continue until good and decent men rise up in their strength and change them. All they need to make the change is the courage of their own convictions. Men will retard human progress and national prosperity not merely by doing wrong but by not doing right. Cowardice prevents men from working out their convictions, it keeps them silent however urgent and righteous the cause. Men who would not be afraid on the battle-field in the presence of an advancing enemy are sometimes too cowardly to propound an unpopular doctrine, to stand by a righteous cause, or advocate a much needed moral reform. A man whose very being is in living alliance with the principles of everlasting truth and right need not fear or be timid, he need not be afraid of sudden fear, not of the desolation of the wicked when it cometh.

**THE DEADLIEST WEAPON.**

ENGLAND'S NEW TWELVE-INCH GUN CAN SHOOT ACROSS THE CHANNEL.  
(London Leader.)  
In accordance with the recommendation of parliament, writes a Woolwich correspondent, the British navy is being strengthened by the addition of a new gun which will ensure the supremacy of Great Britain over the seas for many years to come. It is known as the twelve-inch steel and wire gun, and is not only the best weapon which the Royal Navy has ever had, but is far superior to any gun possessed by any foreign navy.

It weighs fifty tons, is 41 feet long, has a muzzle velocity of 2,367 feet per second. The projectile weighs 850 pounds, the bursting charge being 83 pounds and the firing charge 167 1/2 pounds of cordite. The Admiralty has ordered 450 at a cost of £10,000 each. Of these 150 have been completed and 300 are still in the hands of the contractors.  
Each man of war will carry four of these formidable weapons, and when the navy is supplied they will be issued to forts on the sea front. The new gun will be the heaviest in the service, and will take the place of the 110-ton, 100-ton and 80-ton guns, of which no more are to be made.

The best Krupp gun can fire a shot twelve and a-half miles, and the United States government is constructing at their arsenal at Waterville a monster gun, which, it is said, will carry a heavy shot twenty-one miles. The new British naval gun, though less than half the weight of the American Weapon, mounted on the heights of Dover, can drop a shell on the shores of France. No accuracy of aim could, of course, be obtained or maintained at this long distance, the effective range being 16,000 yards, or between nine or ten miles.

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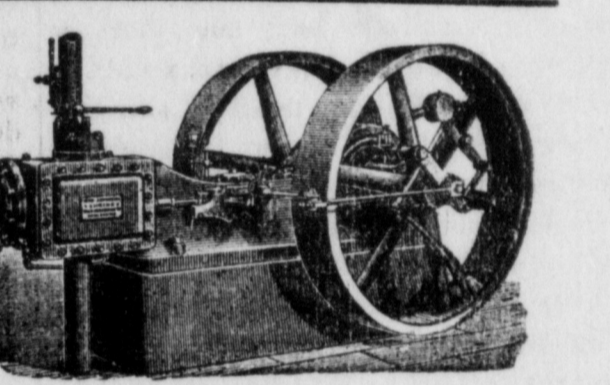
