SHOOTING ACCIDENT.

MONCTON, Dec. 25.—Eli Robichaud, aged 18, employed in the Moncton cotton mill, was the victim of a terrible accident at Dover about six miles from town, yesterday afternoon, while he was in the woods shooting with two young lads. They became separated, and the lads heard a shot, but failing to locate it, became alarmed, and reported Robichaud lost. Search was made, but no trace got of Robichaud till this morning, when his dead body was found near a small clearing, about fifty yards from the road. Apparently Robichaud had slipped on the ice, and endeavoring to save himself the gun was discharged. One side of his face was terribly mutilated by the shot and the skull loosened. Death had no doubt been instantaneous. Deceased was the only support of a widowed mother.
