#### VERY ANXIOUS TO GO.

LONDON, Dec. 24.—A semi-official statement has been given to the press that the Duke of Connaught, the Queen's youngest son, failing under renewed pressure to obtain employment with the forces in South Africa, replied to Gen. Lord Roberts asking that he be attached to his staff in any capacity independent of his military rank, which is that of a general. Lord Roberts consented, but the government declined to sanction the appointment.

CALCUTTA, Dec. 24.—The Sixteenth Lancers, now at Umballa, have been ordered to go to South Africa. Two thousand sharpshooters will be sent from India also.

#### MASSACHUSETTS MURDERS.

##### DREADFUL TRAGEDY AT WEST NATICK.

NATICK, Mass., Dec. 21.—Louis Perry, until recently employed at the Dennison Manufacturing Company at South Framingham, was shot and killed by Miss Lizzie Morse at her home in West Natick this afternoon. Miss Morse claims self-defence. Miss Morse was shortly afterwards put under arrest and claims that circumstances justified her in shooting down Perry.

Perry was about thirty-three years of age, and in company with Arnold Stappen who is about thirty five years of age, both of whom are married, left their homes on Speen street with their bicycles at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Miss Lizzie Morse, the alleged murderer, and the members of her family claim that Perry and Stappen arrived at their house at about 1 30 o'clock and demanded admittance without stating their business. The Morse homestead is one of the most prominent in this section of the state and contains a large family, all of whom are highly respected by the community. When Perry and Stappen arrived at the house the occupants consisted of Mrs. Willard Morse, about eighty years of age, and Miss Electra Morse, forty-eight, Miss Lizzie Morse, thirty-eight, Willard W. Morse, forty-eight, and Rufus D. Morse, forty years of age, children of Mrs. Willard Morse. The two sons have been in poor health and remained on the farm with their mother and sister to assist them as far as their health would permit. While they were engaged at their labors in the barn, it is claimed, the two men arrived at the house on their wheels and demanded admission to the house, and upon being refused smashed several windows, when the women became alarmed and fled to another part of the premises. Miss Lizzie Morse, who is the youngest of the daughters, went to the bureau drawer and loaded a 22 calibre revolver. She claims that the men went round to the front of the house, where Perry finished smashing the glass in one of the windows and climbed in in spite of her remonstrances. After gaining an entrance he grabbed Miss Electra Morse, who was in the act of protecting herself with a croquet mallet, which was wrenched from her hands and with it Perry hit her over the head. Lizzie rushed to her sister's assistance and informed Perry that she would shoot him if he did not leave the house. He gave her a terrific blow with the mallet and felled her to the floor. She managed to get up and again told Perry to get out of the house, when he dared her to shoot. She then fired four shots at Perry, who managed to climb through the window and then fell dead. It is further claimed that Stappen, in the meantime, had attempted to get into a window, but was prevented by Willard Morse, who had heard the noise, Stappen then threw several stones at the windows, and as Perry fell out through the window he said to the wounded man: "Let's get out of this." Perry replied: "You can go, but I can't," and then expired. The members of the Morse family claim that Stappen then tried to get into the house, but upon being prevented he mounted his wheel and went to the West Natick engine house and telephoned for the police.

Miss Lizzie Morse is about 5 feet 5 inches in height and weighs about 160 pounds and is prepossessing in appearance. The revolver she used had not been discharged for twenty years.

HUBBARDSTON, Mass., Dec. 21.—Asa Bennett, of this place, eighty years old, was found murdered in the kitchen of his house shortly before 8.30 o'clock to-night by Mrs. Bennett. She attended a prayer meeting in the Congregational church about one hundred feet from the house, and when she returned home found her husband's body on the floor of the kitchen, the head badly beaten by an iron bolt which was found near the body. There is no clue to the murder.
