YOUNG PEOPLE'S PAPER.—A copy has reached us of the first number of the Young People's Paper, published by T. J. Shanks & Co., at Kingston, Ontario. This journal is intended to be to the young folks of Canada what the Youth's Companion or Harper's Young People is to those of the United States, so far as the much lower price—half a dollar a year—will permit. The number before us contains an interesting selection of short stories, anecdotes, accounts of travel and adventure, glimpses of natural science, bits of useful information, and other matter especially suited to the youthful mind. In an article addressed to parents particular stress is laid on the importance of seeing that their children are supplied with something better than the trashy and degrading literature so common at the present day.

THE STORM.—On Saturday morning a cold northwest wind set in and continued to blow all day, gradually working around to the northeast, and about midnight snow began to fall which looked as though a storm was in progress. On Sunday morning a heavy gale from the northeast was blowing and snow was falling quite heavily which continued until about noon when it changed to rain. It continued to rain until about dark when it again changed to snow, all the while blowing a hurricane and gradually getting worse, abating just before noon on Monday. Although it was not as heavy a storm as last year, considerable damage was done, especially to the wharves. The public wharf which was destroyed by the storm last year and repaired this spring, was again badly damaged, the centre of the wharf being almost carried away, including the railway track, new rails having been laid last week. Had the storm continued much longer the public warehouse on the wharf would have been washed off and probably broken in pieces. Mr. Henry Irving's schooner the Neil Dow which was tied to the public wharf, was slightly damaged, several planks on one side being started. Mr. Wm. Long's pilot schooner was also damaged considerably. O'Leary's wharf also suffered by the storm, the stringers in several places being torn off. With the exception of some of the ballast being washed off Wark's wharf, no damage was done to speak of, it being in the lee of the others. A small wharf was washed away from the back of Mr. Martin Flanagan's store. Fences and trees were blown down in different places and in some sections of the county has made the road almost impassable. It was one of the worst storms which has visited this section for some time. On the level about three inches of snow fell—hardly enough for sleighing.

—Work on the breakwater was suspended on Monday and Tuesday on account of the storm on Sunday.

—Remember the Harvest Supper and Musical Entertainment in the Public hall, Kingston, this (Wednesday) evening.

—The ladies of the Methodist church at West Branch, intend holding a birthday party in the church in the near future.

—Owing to the storm on Sunday there was no service in any of the churches except the Methodist, service being held in that church in the morning.

—Owing to the storm on Sunday the telegraph wires both north and south were blown down in several places and communication with other parts was stopped.

—It is reported around town that seven schooners and a bark went ashore on Buctouche beach during Sunday's storm. The bark hails from Chatham and is owned by a man by the name of Hutchison.

—Word was received here last week stating that the schooner Matilda, Capt. Thomas Haines, had been out in a gale on Friday and had lost part of her sail. It is not known whether she was damaged or not.

—Although scarcely enough snow fell to make sleighing several sleighs were seen about town on Monday and Tuesday. Had about three inches more snow fell the sleighing would have been excellent.

—Mrs. Sylvester Anderson and her daughter, the victims of the Pisgah fire, died Thursday. The doctors were called in and they did all they could to relieve the sufferers, but they both died within 30 hours of the accident.

—Wild fowl appear to be quite plentiful. On Sunday during the storm several large flocks of geese were seen a few yards from the shore of the North beach, but as the man who saw them had no fire arms at the time they remained there unmolested.

—A farmer writes from Five Mile River, Hants Co., that he has been ploughing up Mayflowers every day for a week or so. He has sent us specimens of our delicate, pink-tinted, ever beautiful Mayflowers, in corroboration of his statement.—Truro News.

—Our Pittsburgh, Pa., correspondent writes the following: "Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Schmetz, (nee Miss Bessie Keswick, of Buctouche, N. B.), have taken up their residence at 629 South Negley Avenue, East End, Pittsburgh, Pa. They will remain there during the fall and winter and will visit Paris exposition and other places of interest during the spring and summer of 1900."

—Road Commissioner Irving had men at work last week making a drain across the street from the corner of Cunard street to the old Desbrisay building. A ditch about four feet deep and three feet wide was dug and timber about six inches thick laid on its edge on each side of the ditch, making the drain about two feet wide. This is something which has been wanting for some time and Mr. Irving deserves credit for the way in which the work was done.

—Hon. A. G. Blair, Minister of Railways, is expected to address several meetings on the north shore next week and will speak in this county on Thursday evening, the 23rd inst., in the Public Hall, Kingston. He will be accompanied by Radolph Lemieux, Esq., member of parliament for Montreal, and either Sir Louis Davies or Hon. Mr. Fielding, who will also address the meeting. It was announced that Mr. Blair would speak in Kingston on Friday, the 24th inst., but the date was afterwards changed to the 23rd, at which date the meeting will be held.
