RECENT INVENTIONS.

Patents granted for new and useful devices.

The United States Patent Office has been unusually busy granting patents to inventors for new and useful inventions. Some of them are as follows.

A machine for plucking polts or beating the hair off hides or furs.

Clamp for overshoes, so as they will not slip up and down on the heel of the shoe. A very valuable device for the newspapers, consisting of a galley so arranged that the printer can put late news on his press, using a rotary cylinder for the purpose. A very handy little opener for envelopes, shaped very much like a tin can opener, to run along the edge of an envelope, and warranted not to miss when the end is started rightly. The making of cigars by machine has been facilitated considerably by a device for bunching or filling, something the cigar maker has tried a long while to accomplish. Quite a novelty for boiling eggs, so arranged with an alarm as to ring a bell so hung on a wire when the egg is wanted soft the bell vibrates a little, and when the egg is wanted to be boiled hard the bell is set in motion violently. Self-lubricating journal in which a box containing grease is so arranged inside of a bearing as to revolve with the shaft and lubricate it. A car for carrying poultry on the railroad, or in other words, a poultry car, divided into tiers of coops separated by a longitudinal aisle.



FAR WORSE THAN HOLMES.

AN AWFUL STORY OF CRIME FROM ST. LOUIS.

The Police of St. Louis, Mo., have discovered a house of death, whose horrors seem beyond belief and description. This house is situated at No. 919 Chouteau Avenue, St. Louis.

It was kept by Mrs. Henrietta Bamberger, a baby farmer. She took charge of the children of poor parents, who troubled no further about them.

According to one witness, not less than three hundred infants died in the house, and the bodies of most of them were buried in the cellar. Some witnesses place the number of victims even higher than this, but whatever it may be the police declare that it will be appalling.

Mrs. Bamberger has already been indicted for four crimes—for murder in the first degree and for manslaughter in the first degree on three separate occasions.

The charge of murder in the first degree is based on the strangling in 1895 of an infant of tender age, sex and parentage unknown, whose body was burned in a furnace.

The charges of manslaughter in the first degree relate to the deaths of Mary Holtkamp, on February 13, 1896; of Ida Zimmermann, on March 3, 1896; and of Lydia Bressert, on Sept. 10, 1897.

Mrs. Bamberger's house was also a private hospital, and many grown-up persons died there under circumstances which throw grave suspicion upon her.

The St. Louis police declare that they have caught in Mrs. Bamberger a criminal infinitely more depraved and monstrous than Holmes.

The testimony on which the indictments were found was given by woman formerly employed by Mrs. Bamberger as servants or nurses. Their testimony has already been confirmed by the discovery of some of the remains, and of articles of jewelry and clothing belonging to the dead.

GIRL GOES IN MALE ATTIRE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 15.—The transport City of Para, from Manila, brought an interesting story of the escapades of Miss Beebe Dean, a mysterious young woman, who, in male attire, stowed herself away in the ship and succeeded in reaching Manila despite the vigilance of Colonel Harding and other officers.

She escaped from the City of Para while under heavy guard in Manila harbor, and was not seen again until a week later, when dressed in a khaki suit and wearing a campaign hat, she made a formal call aboard ship.

Miss Dean was not a regular stowaway. On the day the City of Para left San Francisco for Manila with the Twenty-ninth infantry, Miss Dean was given the position of cabin boy, both captain and steward being deceived as to her sex.

Before Honolulu was reached her secret was discovered and she was put ashore on the islands. She managed to get aboard again, but was discovered before Manila was reached. Colonel Harding kept her as prisoner under guard the remainder of the trip, allowing her but twenty minutes exercise a day.

Though the Colonel intended turning her over to the authorities at Manila for transportation back, Miss Dean slipped her guards and landed in Manila, where in a uniform of the Twenty-ninth infantry, she went to the front.

A committee of Philadelphia Friends have begun the shipment of 35,000 pounds of supplies for the Doukhobors, or Russian Quakers in Canada. The consignment includes two cars of cornmeal, four tons of clothing, 100 cases of cotton seed oil, fifteen bales of washing wool for clothing, forty sacks of barley, boxes of malted milk and tea. Three hundred spinning wheels are also to be sent later. When the Doukhobors arrived from Russia, Philadelphia Quakers sent them about \$8,000, and a few weeks ago a shipment of 42,000 pounds of supplies and \$2,000 was forwarded to them. They will require much assistance during the winter, as their first crop last summer was nearly ruined by frost.

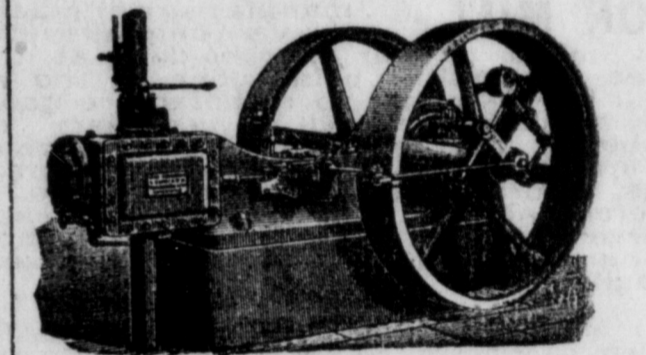
