Light in the poultry house is absolute necessity, and the inmates must have it to be in a healthy condition. Fowls will not thrive in a dark and cheerless place any more than plants will.

With poultry as with other classes of stock, it is a mistake to keep them after they have reached the age, at which they should be marketed, as the food they require each day for their support gives the poultry-keeper no profit unless a gain in weight is going on at the same time.

Your horses should not be skod until they get their full growth. Under this time shoeing may cramp the hoof wall and cause bad feet. When shoes are put on a colt he is usually considered "a horse", and is very apt to get more driving than is good for him at a tender age.

The secret of dairying lies with the man, and success depends wholly upon good management. He who makes dairying a side issue, and a much neglected one at that, by keeping only a few ill cared for cows on a good sized farm is astonished at the man who can keep a goodly number on a few acres.

Because one cow of a particular breed does a remarkable thing is by no means proof that the same may be realized of every other cow of that breed. Some breeds may have a quality that is more likely to be conspicuous in a greater number of animals than another, but no two cows of the same breed perform alike. The matter of notable performances is wholly an individual function.

Now is the time to look well after the young colts as they come to the barns for the long winter months. If, with the dry pastures, they are thin in flesh, good grooming and grain will be necessary to give them a start upward. Good colts today are not made by any neglect but by good care and feed. The only chance for a dollar is by making growth steadily, for size plays an important part in the sale of a horse, more to-day than ever.

### Trained Show Dogs.

"Considering the investment, trained dogs are one of the most profitable attractions in the vaudeville line." said an old time showman here with one of the current theatrical companies. "I suppose there are at least 12 or 15 troupes of them scattered over the country," he continued, "and the good ones easily average a couple of hundred a week and expenses. As there are no salaries to pay for the dogs and no hotel bills for anybody except the proprietor and one keeper the returns are rather handsome. Nowadays they have the business down to such a fine point that the sudden death of any of the animals can be readily remedied by telegraphing to New York, where several men make a specialty of keeping standard trick dogs in stock."

"A dog troupe usually consists of five performers, one of which is a star. The star probably costs \$150 and the others about \$50 apiece. Mongrels of no intrinsic worth are generally selected for training purposes, because they learn as quickly as the thoroughbreds and if anything happens to them the loss is so much lighter. There is a standard series of tricks which they are taught to do, so that one can easily replace another, and a little ingenuity on the part of the showman supplies the variety to the programme."—New Orleans Times-Democrat.

### Ancient Chains.

In an interesting article on the subject of chains an English writer points to the fact that notwithstanding the frequent mention of chain in the Bible the article is comparatively new. The same author says:

"Some authorities give the Britons credit for originating the cable chain because Julius Caesar is recorded as having been unable to cut the cables of the Gaul's vessels, 'as they were made of iron.' This may have been a chain in the present acceptance of the term, but it is doubtful because the first patent for chainmaking was obtained in England in 1684 by a blacksmith named Philip White. The patent was for 14 years, and in consideration of it White had to pay £5 in lawful money yearly 'at the Feast of the Blessed Virgin and Saint Michell the Archangel by even and anal process.'"

"His patent is described as follows: 'A way for the wearing of ships with iron chaynes by finding out the true heating (pre)paring and tempering of lron for that (pur)pose and that he hath nowe attained to the true use of the said chaynes and that the same wilbe for the great saving of cordage and safety of shippers and will redound to good of our Comon Wealth.'"

### Early French Theaters.

The French theater owes its origin to the religious exhibitions given by the pilgrims on their return from Palestine. At these exhibitions the pilgrims gave an account of the Holy Land and recited their own adventures. They were afterward imitated by those who had never been to the Holy Land. To these succeeded dramatic representations of subjects taken from the new text, which, being forbidden by the provost of Paris, the priests of France invited the king to be present at an exhibition to prove that they were calculated to excite religious feelings.

The building in which those plays were produced was divided into three scaffoldings—the highest represented paradise, the second the world and the lowest, which was in the form of a dragon's head, represented hell. The only entrance to the two upper scaffoldings was through the dragon's head. The actors never left the stage, even to change their dress, and the plays were so long as to require several days for their completion. At the close of each evening the audience was invited to return until the whole were finished, sometimes 40 nights.

### The Power of a Cyclone.

Careful estimates of the force of a cyclone and the energy required to keep a full fledged hurricane in active operation reveal the presence of a power that makes the mightiest efforts of man appear as nothing in comparison. A force fully equal to 478,000,000 horsepower was estimated as developed in a West Indian cyclone. This is about 15 times the power that is creatable by all the means within the range of man's capabilities during the same time.

Were steam, water, windmills and the strength of all men and all animals combined they could not at all approach the tremendous force exerted by this terrible storm.

### A Barium Surprise.

A good story of the late George Augustus Sala and Barium is told. It was on the occasion of the last visit of the famous showman to England, when a public dinner was tendered to Mr Barium. Mr Sala presided. In the reception room, where all were waiting to welcome the guest of the evening, Mr Barium came in, beaming and shaking hands with the chairman, said: "This is indeed a surprise to me." "Did you hear that?" Mr. Sala whispered. "Why, he arranged for the dinner himself!"

### SUSSEX MAN IN THE WEST.

A special from Grand Forks, B. C. to the Montreal Star, says: F. M. McLeod, of this city, who bonded the Yankee Girl and Yankee Boy on Hardy Mountain six weeks ago, has shipped a car load of twenty tons of ore to the Trail smelter. This formed the first shipment of ore by rail from the boundary country, and made the event somewhat historic. The returns are expected to exceed \$100 per ton in gold and silver. The group is only one and one half miles distant from Grand Forks. A shaft has been sunk one hundred feet. It is connected with a tunnel one hundred feet long. Near the face of the tunnel a cross-cut has been driven 15 feet, and in it the ore is from twelve to twenty-seven inches wide. The latest assay gave 29 ozs. gold and 12 ozs. of silver per ton. Mr. McLeod is a Sussex man, but has been in the west a number of years.

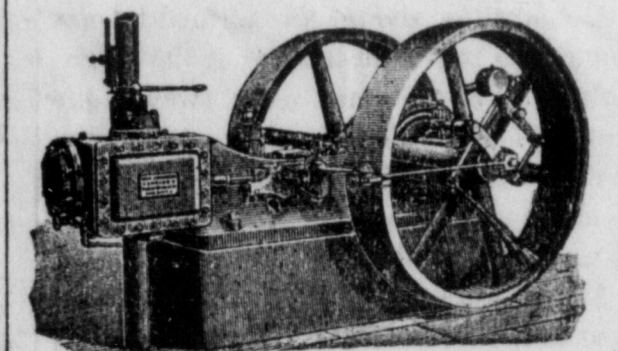

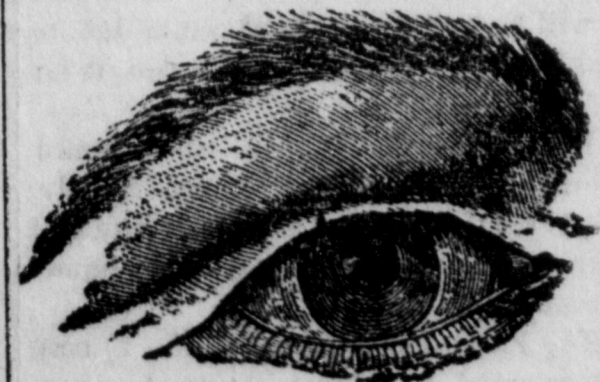
