THE 100,000 VOTES MOVEMENT—A TWENTIETH CENTURY CAMPAIGN.

DEAR FRIENDS.—Herewith we send you some documents which explain themselves, relating to a plan of campaign which we trust you will cordially approve...

We want to make this a great TWENTIETH CENTURY campaign. This idea should be strongly urged. We must begin the new hundred years with legislation that will be a mighty boon to our own land...

To secure for this important movement the fullest measure of success, the following suggestions are respectfully submitted:—

Everyone who receives these circulars is earnestly requested to bring them as soon as possible before any church congregation, Young People's Society, temperance society or other organization with which he may be connected...

A committee should be formed to arrange for a thorough canvass of the neighborhood. Every man over twenty-one years of age should be asked to sign the pledge. A special judicious effort should be made to secure influential and respected men to head the list.

A well announced public meeting will be a help to the work. Circular No. 1 should be read to the audience. Good speakers from different churches and of different political parties should advocate the plan. Copies of the pledge may be circulated among the audience for signature.

The plan should be advocated on every possible occasion, and brought up at every meeting at which it can be usefully discussed. A special meeting of pledgers may be helpful. The great work now is the work of enrolment.

Special attention should be called to the fact that we are not excluding Quebec. We must go on to national prohibition. Our Quebec friends, however, believe that we are wise in immediately insisting upon what no reasonable person can refuse. Success in this will give us more power and stronger reasons in demanding the wider measure.

All lists of names should be promptly forwarded to the Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, the number of names being certified upon each list by the canvasser. It will be well for the local committee to make a copy of each list and retain it for future reference and use.

Postage on the pledges when signed should be paid at letter rates, namely, two cents per ounce. One letter rate will carry any number up to six, of the signed pledge sheets.

The Pledge Sheet (Circular No. 2) may be enlarged by adding sheets of paper. Any needed number of additional copies will be forwarded by the Alliance Secretary, on receipt of a post card asking for them. The Secretary will also promptly and cheerfully furnish any further information in his possession, regarding this great campaign.

GENERAL NEWS.

London, Ont., labor men have nominated a municipal ticket and published a platform.

Last Thursday morning the maritime express from Montreal ran into a snow storm near Rimouski. At Bic the ground was covered with four inches of snow, and snow continued to fall until Campbellton was reached. The weather was bitterly cold.

The Lady Marjorie Gordon, daughter of Lady Aberdeen is at present studying at Westfield in preparation for the University of London. She seems to be enjoying the experience, although her daily time table sounds rather alarming to some of her friends.

Word has been received at the Justice Department, Ottawa, that one John Sargo has confessed at Seattle to the murder of Louis Bailos on the Klondike river. His extradition to Canada for trial has been demanded and will no doubt be accomplished without trouble.

The Newfoundland government is considering a proposal to form half the colonial police into a company for service in the Transvaal. The Canadian government will be requested, it is understood, to incorporate this company with the second Canadian regiment, Newfoundland paying a proportionate share of the expenses.

Three directors of the defunct Banque Ville Marie, charged with issuing false statements to the government, Wm. Weeia, F. Smith and E. Lichtenheim, were arraigned before the court of Queen's bench at Montreal, Thursday after the grand jury had returned a true bill against them. Counsel McMaster asked for delay until he studied the indictment, and the request was granted.

Eight members of the Scotsman's crew, accused of stealing passengers' property, were honorably discharged by Judge Choquette at Montreal Thursday. The judge considered that the arrests were justified on account of the rumors prevalent, which were proved to have been grossly exaggerated. Four more cases remain to be disposed of. Only two have been found guilty so far.

On Oct. 28 the Salvation Army sent a staff of specially selected officers from London, England, to the seat of war in South Africa. The staff includes several certificated nurses and one or two men of exceptional education, who speak several languages. The staff is in command of Miss Murry, a daughter of General Murry. She has seen military service in India and will be of great assistance on the field of battle. General Buller and President Kruger have both promised to protect the Salvation Army officers and consider them as neutrals, and the governments have given them permission to follow the armies. All the shelters, hospitals and headquarters of the army in South Africa have been appropriated for military use, and the army has temporarily abandoned its ordinary work and is devoting its attention to the succor of the wounded. There are among the forces on both sides many Salvation Army members.

She did not suppose her father was caught in the bed until she had looked through the other rooms of the house and could not find him. It took five men to unfold the bed. Mr. Daw's neck was broken. He lingered in unconsciousness until Saturday.
