LADYSMITH, Nov. 1, afternoon, via Cape Town) -Four naval long range guns have been mounted here.

PARIS, Nov. 3 .- The London correspondent of the Liberte says that the Boers in strong force, under General Lucas Meyer, are occupying the town of Colen. so, thirty-five miles south of Ladysmith, thus completely investing the latter place. The correspondent adds that General Meyer took part in Monday's battle, but continued his flanking movement until he reached Colenso, with the result that there was renewed fighting south of Ladysmith, in which the British lost another 1,000 in killed, wounded and prisoners. General Meyer, according to the French correspondent, now holds the railway from Ladysmith to Pietermaritzburg and Durban.

NO NEWS FRGM LADYSMITH.

LONDON, Nov. 4 .- The War office at noon to day announced that nothing had been received there in any way modifying or altering the statement issued yesterday afternoon saying that belated despatches from Ladysmith were coming through. Nothing has been received to corroborate the reiterated reports from Berlin of the capitulation of General White.

A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Pietermaritzburg, dated yesterday, said Ladysmith was perfectly quiet that morning and another despatch from the same place to the Exchange Telegraph Company says a number of · women and children left Ladysmith yesterday on a passenger train escorted by the armored train.

A third despatch to the exchange Telegraph Company, dated Cape Town, November 1, announces that the Boers have entered Cape Colony at Norvalspruit, destroying several bridges.

The Exchange Telegraph Company later corrected its Pietermaritzburg dates to Wednesday, November 1, so they lose Mgnificance.

LONDON, Nov. 6 .- An immense weight was lifted from the public mind by the brief official despatch published this morniug, by which the continental stories of disaster at Ladysmith proved to be false, although the despatch itself revived the anxiety of the more timid in another direction, as it indicated that General White, instead of sitting still and acting wholly on the defensive persists in sortieing and risking another Nicholson's Nek disaster. The generally cheering tone of the despatch showing there is no anxiety at Ladysmith as "egards the ability of the beleagued garrison to hold its own, has an excellent effect on the country. From the fact that General White is able to take the offensive and shell the Boer camp it seems that Ladysmith is not so closely besieged as was supposed. The coming of the Boers into Cape Colony is beginning to awaken the British to the fact they under estimated the forces they will have to meet and that even General Buller's task may not be as easy as anticipated The evacuation of Colenso and withdrawal of the British forces from Stromberv are still unexplained.
