AN AWFUL MURDER.

DECEYED TO HIS FATE BY HIS OWN WIFE.

KAMLOOPS, B. C., Nov. 1.—John Hayes was arrested here last evening on the charge of having committed one of the most diabolical murders in the annals of crime. Hayes is only an assumed name, the prisoner's right name being Alva Quigley. He is also known by the alias of John Hayes, Boxton. The crime for which Hayes or Quigley has been arrested sounds more like fiction than actual facts. Early in 1898 a family named Quigley, consisting of father, mother, two daughters and two sons, removed from Missouri, United States, to Lacombe, a small place on the Calgary and Edmonton Railway, in the province of Alberta. One of the daughters were married to a man named Nelson Hagel, who accompanied her to Alberta. Both the Quigley family and the Hagels took up ranches, and for a while all went well. However, one day, in June, 1898, Mr. and Mrs. Hagel and Alva Quigley were seen to drive out of Lacombe in a double rig, and about five hours later Mrs. Hagel and her brother returned without Hagel. They then gave it out that Hagel had gone to the Peace River, via the Edmonton trail, and six weeks later Mrs. Hagel showed her neighbors letters purporting to come from her husband in Peace river. This aroused the suspicions of the authorities, as Hagel could not possibly reach Peace river in less than two months. Another suspicious circumstance was the fact that Mrs. Hagel and her brother, Alva Quigley, lived together as man and wife. Matters then became so hot that Alva Quigley suddenly left Lacombe. Mrs. Hagel's father then induced a wealthy old man named Stewart to go and live with Mrs. Hagel. The two, however, quarreled, but not before Stewart had learned from Mrs. Hagel that her husband had been murdered. She had Stewart arrested on the charge of assault, and then Stewart peached on her.

Mrs. Hagel two weeks ago was arrested on suspicion of having murdered her husband. She then confessed, and went with the authorities to a swamp thirteen miles from Lacombe, and pointed out where her husband's body was buried. The body was soon discovered, and she recognized it as that of her husband, Nelson Hagel.

Mrs. Hagel, in describing the murder, said that her brother placed the lines around Hagel's neck. She then held them while her brother took a hammer and broke Hagel's skull. They then buried the body in the swamp. On the body being found, an inquest was held, and a verdict of murder returned against Mrs. Hagel and Alva Quigley. Mrs. Hagel was then committed to Edmonton gaol. When Quigley left Lacombe he made his way to British Columbia, and three months ago came to Kamloops where he secured work with the provincial road gang. The authorities discovered his whereabouts through intercepting a letter to his sister, and yesterday Sergeant Ashton of the North-West Mounted Police came here and drove out to where the road gang were working, and arrested Quigley. He was placed in gaol here, and to-night Sergt. Ashton will leave with him for the scene of the crime. Your correspondent saw Quigley at the gaol here this morning. Quigley is a man of 27 years of age clean shaven, dark hair, and prominent nose. He takes his rest quite coolly. Quigley's father and mother and brother are also to be arrested as accessories to the murder. Letters have been secured which show that they knew of the murder of Hagel, in fact helped to plan it.

KLONDIKERS RETURN.

W. W. BODDY AND GEORGE PINDER OF THE BLACK PARTY.
 (Fredericton Herald.)

W. W. Boddy and Geo. Pinder, members of the Geo. Black Klondike party, arrived in the city by the western train, Oct. 27. They came direct from Vancouver, having arrived there from Bennett early last week. Both are looking exceedingly well and there are no outward indications that either suffered physically during their prolonged sojourn in the Yukon country in pursuit of the fickle goddess of fortune. Mr. Boddy conversed freely to a Herald representative regarding the expedition, and frankly admitted that from a financial standpoint the expectations of the party had not been realized. He said that the members of the party had prospected over a large extent of territory, and had staked off some claims, but whether the claims were valuable or not, was a question he could not answer.

Messrs. Boddy and Pinder separated from George Black and Amereaux early in the month. They were then near the Hootlingna, and were fitting up a cabin for next season. Mr. Graham, another member of the party is now at Bennett working for a lumber concern. Mr. Boddy says that Messrs. Black, Graham and Amereaux are all coming home this fall. Some of the party may return to the gold regions next spring and Mr. Boddy says that he would give it another trial were he a younger man, but as things are, he thinks he will remain at home. He likes the country first rate and is convinced that there is lots of gold out there if one is only lucky enough to find it.

Mr. Boddy did not return from the gold diggings altogether empty handed. He had with him a small bag containing upwards of a dozen bright nuggets, worth perhaps \$50 collectively, and several samples of rich looking quartz. He was met at the depot by Mrs. Boddy and their two sons, and the party left for their home at Prince William the same afternoon.

HOW TO DRY WET SHOES.

When without overshoes, you have been caught in a heavy rain storm, perhaps you have known already what to do with your best kid boots, which have been thoroughly wet through, and which, if left to dry in the ordinary way, will be stiff, brittle and unsightly. If not, you will be glad to learn what I heard only recently, from one whose experience is of value.

First, wipe off gently with a soft cloth, all surface water and mud; then, while still wet, rub well with kerosene oil, using for the purpose the furred side of Canton flannel. Set them aside until partially dry, when a second treatment of oil is advisable. They may then be deposited in a conveniently warm place, where they will dry gradually and thoroughly. Before applying French kid dressing, give them a final rubbing with the flannel, still slightly dampened with kerosene and your boots will be soft and flexible as new did, and will be very little affected by their bath in the rain.

ANOTHER CANADIAN REGIMENT

HAS BEEN OFFERED AND A REPLY IS LOOKED FOR TO-DAY.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—The Canadian government have not yet received any definite reply to the offer forwarded to the imperial authorities to send a second contingent to assist her majesty's forces in the Transvaal. The offer was acknowledged and Lord Minto was informed that it had been submitted to the war officer. An answer is expected to-day.

The premier lost no time in informing the home authorities of the sympathy of Canada on account of the reverse at Ladysmith and the desire of the government to send to the front more troops to aid Great Britain in establishing its supremacy in South Africa. That the government intended acting at once was foreshadowed in this correspondence on Wednesday last. The announcement is well received here.

QUEBEC, Nov. 4.—The newspapers state that the government's offer of a second Canadian regiment for service in South Africa has been accepted. Volunteers are offering for enlistment.

NEWFOUNDLAND HELPS.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 4.—The Newfoundland government is considering a proposal to form half the colonial police into a company for service in the Transvaal. The Canadian government will be requested, it is understood, to incorporate this company with the second Canadian regiment, Newfoundland paying proportionate share of the expenses. The colonial police, being like the Royal Irish Constabulary, a semi-military body, armed, well drilled and fully equipped, could take the field at once. The scheme meets with general popular approval.

CLEARLY AND TERSELY TOLD

THE LONDON TIMES COMPLIMENTS PREMIER LAURIER.

TORONTO, Nov. 1.—The Telegram's special cable from London says: Sir Wilfred Laurier's address to the Canadian South African contingent, prior to its embarkation at Quebec, is warmly commended. The Times says: 'Sir Wilfred described the present situation in language which could not be bettered by any English statesman.' It quotes the following from the premier's speech: 'It is not so much the God of battle as the God of justice we invoke. It is inspiring to reflect that the cause for which you men of Canada are going to fight, is the cause of justice, the cause of humanity, of civil rights and religious liberty. This war is not a war of conquest or subjugation. It is not to oppress a race whose courage we admire, but it is to put an end to oppression imposed upon subjects of Her Majesty in South Africa by a tyrannical people. The object is not to crush out the Dutch population but to establish in that land, of which Her Majesty is suzerain, British sovereign law to assure to all men of that country an equal share of liberty.' Commenting on the foregoing the Times says it would be impossible to put the case more tersely, more clearly or more justly.

One of the greatest financial combinations of the century is in process of formation. The organizers of the Continental Telegraph and Cable Company, recently incorporated in New Jersey, have obtained control of all the independent telephone companies in the United States and aim to combine these with the great telegraph companies and the five Atlantic cable companies. The capitalists interested in the venture include George J. Gould, John Jacob Astor, William C. Whitney, P. A. B. Widener and William L. Elkies. Verification of the story was obtained Thursday night from Mr. Widener at his home in Ogoniz.

A WILD COW

ORRATES A STIR IN TAYLOR VILLAGE, PARISH OF DORCHESTER.

TAYLOR VILLAGE, Oct. 30.—A ferocious cow belonging to a butcher named Dominick Belleveau, of College Bridge, caused an unusual commotion among the residents of our quiet little village on Monday last. The cow, which is four years old, was purchased for beef last spring by Belleveau, from Charles Armour of this place, and while being led to slaughter made a desperate attempt to gore Belleveau, and escaped to the woods where she remained during the summer. When the cow appeared near here on Monday last, Charles Armour, Clifford Chapman, Eldred Chapman, Martin O'Brien and Belleveau, armed with guns, pitch forks, and knives, boldly set out to capture the animal, dead or alive, but found that she was as wild as a moose and sufficiently crazed to cause her to rush at her pursuers with a will to gore them to pieces. Armour put four bullets in the cow's head, then she ran furiously, jumping creeks and fences, till two more charges were lodged in her head, which did not even bring her to a stand still. Clifford Chapman then headed her off by putting two charges of goose shot into her head, which staggered her some. At this point Cliff's big bull dog was released and also took a hand in the fray. The dog seized the cow by the jaw, Eldred and Dominick each grabbed a horn, Cliff the tail and away they went across fields and along the highway.

By this time Cliff, who saw that the pursuers were more fatigued than the cow, shouted for the butcher's knife. Dominick said there was big danger, but no sooner had Cliff severed a large vein in her neck than she assisted him over the read fence. O'Brien who was then on the scene, took up an apple tree and Dominick and Eldred fled for their lives. Then things took a turn. The cow again started furiously along the road, bleeding freely but apparently unhindered by the bull dog attachment on her tail, till confronted by Armour who put another bullet into her head, which brought her down. The animal was very fat and dressed some 500 lbs. of excellent beef.
