has also some fine imported stock.

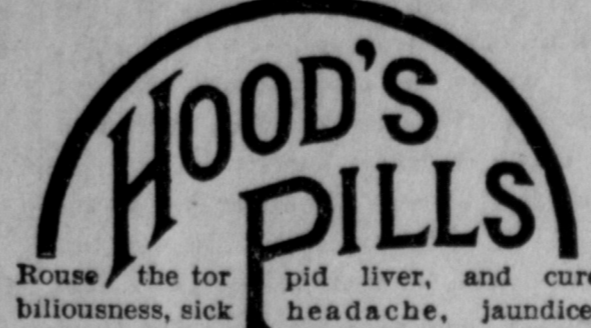
—The Moncton Times of Monday
