The question of providing for the teaching of French was again brought up by Sheriff Leger and discussed by all the speakers in a favorable way, but left for Trustees to make whatever arrangements seemeth best for the carrying out of such proposiyear remains the same as that of the past year namely \$1100.00. Considerable talk was indulged in with reference to summer vacation, and a vote in favor of eight weeks was subsequently carried.


