KILLED AT BUCTOUCHE.

WILLIAM MCKEE, FIREMAN ON THE M. & B. RY., CRUSHED BETWEEN THE CARS.

OCT. 17th.—A sad accident occurred this morning at 8.30, in the yard of the M. & B. Ry., at Buctouche. The victim was the young and popular fireman, Will McKee, of Little River, Buctouche. The usual morning shunting was being done, McKee being at the time out of his engine. There was occasion to couple a car of timber to the engine, and McKee proceeded to do so, though it was not his appointed work. A piece of scantling projected several inches over the end of the car, and it is not known whether the young man was aware of this, though his attention was called to the same by a near by spectator. The engine approached the car at a slow rate, and under ordinary circumstances no harm could happen. Whether the man's attention was attracted to other matters, or whether he slipped, may never be known; when the cars came together, his head was crushed between the scantling and the tender and instantly he was between the wheels of the train. He was extracted from this perilous position and tenderly laid upon the grass, his white, blood-stained face bathed with water and every attention rendered which love and pity could suggest. Dr. King was hastily summoned, and, with Dr. Landry, made a careful examination. He was removed to his rooms at the Bay View Hotel, and his mother and father sent for with the engine. Every attention was given by the medical men and friends, without avail. He passed away without regaining consciousness about four hours and a half after the accident occurred. A careful examination revealed the fact that one leg and an arm had been broken, but no cuts were found upon the body. Only last Friday he applied for a policy on his life, and it is not yet known whether it was accepted. Wm. McKee was well known and much liked here and elsewhere, and his sudden death cast a deep gloom over the community. A large number of relatives are left to mourn under this grievous blow.

LASHED TO THE FOREMAST.

BATHURST, Oct. 12.—A very severe storm from the northeast was experienced by fishermen in the Bay of Chaleur on Thursday, 6th inst. Two lives were lost. Saturday morning there came ashore at Little Shippegan river a fishing smack from Cape Gascon, on the Quebec side. To the foremast was lashed a man named Emile Huard. He was still alive, but in a very exhausted condition, having suffered untold misery during Thursday and Friday nights. In the cuddy was the inanimate body of Thos. Atkinson. Another of the crew, a boy aged 11 years and brother of Emile Huard, had been lost overboard during the storm. Friends were immediately notified of the disaster, and a boat was sent from Anse and Gascon to bring back the only survivor and his dead companion. While trying to weather the storm in a distressed condition this boat was passed by another fishing schooner, and it is stated that those on board positively refused to render any assistance.
