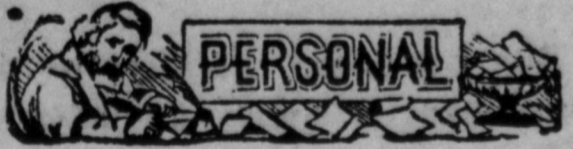

—Messrs J. & T. Jardine's bark Valma, arrived outside the harbor Saturday morning, and was towed into port Sunday morning by the tug Callana. She is loaded with salt for Mr. R. O'Leary.

—In the C. W. A. Maritime Champion ships at Moncton on Monday W. E. Jardine, of Antigonish, son of Mr. John Jardine, of Kingston, won the 5 mile championship in 14 minutes and 51 seconds.

—Mathew Garnett of St. John, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester penitentiary for an assault upon Miss Bessie Carpenter of the same city and the arcey of \$10 from the North End Post Office.

—Mr. C. K. Short, of St. John, preached last Sabbath in the Methodist Church, at Richibucto, Molus River and Kingston. The discourses were based on acts, and were listened to with great attention and profit, and were attended with power.

—Sir Louis Davies will sail for England on the 9th instant, accompanied by Mr. Joseph Pope, Under-Secretary of State, to make to Lord Salisbury strong representations regarding the facts surrounding the Alaska boundary dispute.—Gazette.

—The Dorchester correspondent of the St. John Globe says: On Saturday last while Maxim Landry, of College Bridge, was using a whip quite freely on the horses, a knot that was on the lash struck him on the eye. A quantity of the interior substance of the eye oozed out, and it is supposed the sight is totally destroyed.

—Mr. John Taylor, of Kingston, has had a soda fountain placed in his store which is giving perfect satisfaction. He has six different flavors and is prepared to give those wishing a nice cool drink, something that will refresh you. This is something which the people of Richibucto and Kingston should patronize as it is worthy of the attention of the public.

—A terrible accident, resulting in the loss of seven lives, occurred off Halifax harbor Monday morning. The victims were members of a picnic party which left there for McNab's Island. While on their way home a gust of wind struck the boat and tore the mast from its box. A second gust forced the heavy timber back, striking the bottom and knocking a gaping hole through.

—The attention of the Road Commissioner is called to the dangerous condition of some parts of the sidewalks around town. One in particular is that on Shedden street. This sidewalk is not in a safe condition for people to walk on especially on a dark night, it being full of holes. There are also several other parts in the same condition. Some steps should be taken to have these sidewalks repaired or new ones laid.

—At Shediac last Thursday morning, a young man named Oliver Melanson, aged 22 years, while riding on a bicycle near the railway station, was noticed to fall over suddenly, and was supposed to have fainted. Prompt assistance was rendered and restoratives applied, but he died in a few moments, presumably from heart failure. A slight abrasion on the forehead was the only injury discovered. Deceased was a nephew of O. M. Melanson, M. P., and he was employed as a clerk in his uncle's store.—Sun.

—Prof. Lewand Baldwin, the armless vocalist, who has been travelling through Canada and the United States, performed in the Masonic hall, Saturday night, to a large audience. Prof. Baldwin uses his feet in writing, drawing, etc. He is the smallest man in America. His exhibition of ventriloquism was well worth the notice of the public, and his singing alone was worth the price of admission. Miss Alice Worth, the Australian wonder, accompanied him and her exhibition of second sight and mind reading is worthy of note. They performed in the Public hall, Kingston, on Monday night.

—The Dorchester correspondent of Tuesday's St. John Globe says: While Premier Emmerson and his son Henry and daughter Emily were driving from Hotel Windsor to their residence this afternoon the harness gave away and the horse ran towards the I. C. R. station. The occupants of the carriage were thrown
