#### ACCIDENT ON THE D. A. R.

IN WHICH MANY LIVES WERE IN GREAT PERIL.

HALIFAX, Sept. 23.—It was little short of a miracle that an accident to a military train at Mount Uniacke station last night was not attended with great loss of life and damage to property.

The train which left the rails was a special made up of an engine, tender and eight cars. It left Aldershot shortly after ten o'clock, loaded with officers and men of the 63rd Rifles, bound for Halifax.

There was nothing in the way of a quick run, so all steam was clapped on, and a gallop of about 35 miles an hour was maintained until just before Mount Uniacke station was reached, when fortunately speed was reduced, and at the time of the accident could not have been going faster than 20 miles an hour.

Just after passing the station passengers felt a jar and the next they knew the front part of the train was off the track. In the cars nearest the engine the shock was very severe, and some men in the colonist sleepers were thrown from their berths onto the floor. One man was thrown with great force right across the car, and struck heavily against the berth on the other side. He was stunned by the shock, but was not injured or bruised. The engineer was thrown out of his cab and struck on his back, bruising it badly, but breaking no bones.

The engine and tender, baggage and horse car and second class passenger coach left the rails, but were not overturned. As soon as particulars of the accident were known a message was sent to Halifax for a special train to bring the passengers in, and to Kentville for a wrecking train.

The wrecking train arrived first, and all hands turned to and helped the train crew, with the result that before the Halifax special arrived the baggage car and second class car were back on the track. The rails were slightly torn up where the cars went off, but only for a few feet, so it will not interfere with traffic to any extent. The accident occurred just at the Halifax end of the switch at Mount Uniacke.

It appears that the switch was opened to allow the train with the 66th Princess Louise Fusiliers to go on the siding in order to let a freight train pass. After the freight passed the switch was shifted and locked, so the Fusiliers' train could proceed. There was no light on the semaphore or no sign to let the engineer of the next train know that anything was wrong, and he, not dreaming of any obstruction, ran his train head into it. All agree that it was only by intervention of Providence that many were not killed, as the shock in the front cars was very severe and men were thrown in all directions.
