

#### A REMARKABLE RESCUE.

THREE WOMEN AND A MAN RESCUE THREE FROM A WATERY GRAVE.

The manner in which three women and a man saved the lives of a passenger and two members of the crew of the steamer Chilkat, which was wrecked on Humboldt Bar, while going out of harbor of Eureka, is remarkable.

The Rev. P. E. Peterson, the pastor of the Scandinavian Methodist Church of Eureka, had gone to the life saving station to see some of the members of the crew with whom he was acquainted. While he was there the plight Chilkat was discovered.

The life boat was sent out and when the preacher went on the beach, where he was speedily joined by Mrs. McLean, Mrs. R E. Henning and Miss Shumway. They saw the wreckage drift in and an empty life boat. Presently Mrs. Henning disently clinging to some wreckage and much

Mr. Peterson waded through the surf, keeping upright with difficulty until he reached the man, who was a passenger Lamed Mooser, from Oakland. Peterson dragged him through the water to the shore, where the women came to his aid. The rescued man was unable to stand and was almost unconscious.

When the second man was discovered among some wreckage. He was Peter Johnson, the first mate. He was making a desperate effort with his remaining strength to keep up in the water, there being not enough wreckage about him to support his weight.

The minister reached John just as he was about to let go, and with the aid of women dragged him to a place of safety While they were caring for this man Miss Shumway discovered a third man and immediately ran to the water to rescue him.

As the plucky young woman plunged into the water, a receding breaker carried Fireman Hanson farther out. But she did not turn back. She was determined that the man should be saved.
