



GARDEN PARTY.—On Wednesday evening, July 5th, the Roman Catholics of Richibucto will hold a Garden Party on the beautiful grounds adjoining the Presbytery. DEATH OF FRED H. WARD.—We have this week to record one of the saddest events which has taken place for some time. On Saturday, June 24th, Fred H. Ward passed away in the 29th year of his age, leaving a wife and four small children to mourn their sad loss of a kind and loving husband and father. The deceased had not enjoyed very good health for some weeks, but was always able to attend to his work, and on Saturday evening retired, seemingly, in his usual health. He had not been in bed long, when his wife was aroused by his struggling, and found him in an unconscious state, out of which he never rallied. Interment took place at Bass River burying ground Monday afternoon. The funeral was the largest seen in this locality for some time, seventy-five teams followed the remains to their last resting place.

A DISASTROUS GALE.—The storm of last Wednesday night and Thursday was the worst seen here for some time. A high tide and terrific northeast gale raised a very heavy sea which caused a large amount of damage, especially at Richibucto Cape. A Caraqueet fishing smack was seen off the coast battling with the elements. It is not known whether the crew succeeded in reaching a harbor; when last seen they were helplessly drifting to the southward. At Richibucto Cape Joseph Caissey lost two boats, Pat Richard three, Jas. Richard one, Calixte White, two, Sawyer Bros., two. The coast for miles is heaped with broken lobster traps, salmon nets, mackerel nets and wreckage. Considerable damage was done at the South beach. Booth & Co. met with the loss of a wharf and some mackerel nets and two of W. S. Loggie's boats came ashore badly wrecked. No lives are reported lost.

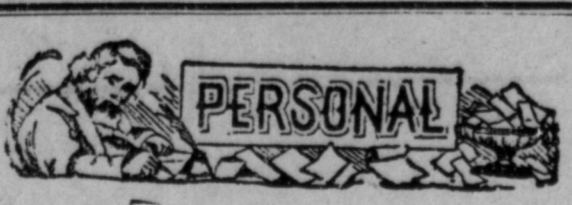
