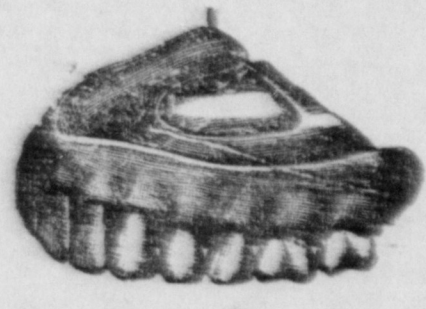

## FISH NOTES.

The lobster season in Nova Scotia has been way below last year. The canners will not have more than two-thirds of a pack.

The clam market in New York was cornered more than once during the last week. Prices went up, and there was a howl all along the line.

A marked chinook salmon, the first seen at this place, was delivered to J. Sheldon last Friday. The fish weighed 41 pounds and was a pretty specimen of the royal chinook.—Oregon Mist.

The mackerel run will probably end on the Southern and western Nova Scotia shores about July, from present indications. Most of the traps have paid their cost of the season, about \$1,500. The fish caught from now on will represent a profit outside of the daily expenses.

The possibilities of the fisheries of Nova Scotia are very great. The shores are teeming with fish. The country is awakening to the fact that something should be done to develop them. The people heretofore have had very little faith in them, but are beginning to see that capital and energy will do wonders; hence more activity.

The question of the duty on fish between Canada and the United States is one that the average Canadian is deeply interested in. There is no doubt that convincing arguments on both sides could be used, yet the question remains open, and it is doubtful if the two governments ever get to a better understanding until the question of politics is eliminated.

If something is not done very soon the lobster will not only be a luxury but a thing of the past. The question is a serious one for Canada as well as for the United States. The lobster is growing more scarce every year, and the fishermen heretofore indifferent, are beginning to realize that either a uniform law along the whole Atlantic Coast or a closed season for several years should be inaugurated, with the co-operation of the Maritime Provinces, in order to give the lobster a chance to propagate. The question is a vital one, and is under discussion throughout the provinces. Nothing definite has been done toward a solution of this important problem. Lobster commissions have been inaugurated, but have accomplished little or nothing. In the mean time the lobster fishery is slowly but surely being exterminated. The industry has been a valuable one, and has given employment to thousands of fishermen. The prospects now seem to point to the fact that unless immediate action is taken the lobster fishermen will have to seek another branch of the fisheries for a living. This will necessitate a sacrifice of fishing gear, etc.—always an expensive experiment. We trust the authorities of both countries will take immediate action for the preservation of this valuable fishery.—Fishing Gazette.

## MADDEST RUSH IN YUKON HISTORY.

REPORTED FIND OF CHUNKS OF VIRGIN GOLD: THE OTHER SIDE.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 21.—The steamer Tees, of the C. P. R. line, reached here yesterday afternoon with about fifty passengers. It is estimated that they have about \$50,000. Those with gold sacks are as follows: Benjamin Butler, who has spent two years on Bonanza creek, and is said to have \$8,000 to \$10,000. F. W. Kipp, who came to Victoria to purchase supplies, and has \$6,000 in care of the purser. M. J. Freeman, about \$6,000. W. C. Peacock, \$5,000 in gold for traveling expenses; he has a half interest in 17 Below, on Eldorado, where 37 men are at work. It is said they will clear up on this claim \$1,200,000 or more. E. L. Dudley, \$4,000 to \$5,000; S. Chubb, of Crossland; Wm. T. E. North, Irving; A. Roy, and Arthur and Edward Lee were other Dawsonites, the majority of whom are well provided with gold.

Bringing besides treasure, the Tees brings news of a wonderfully rich strike on the hills at the back of Dahl river, in the Koyukuk district. If reports brought to Dawson by passengers up the river from Circle City and Forty Mile be true, chunks of virgin gold, some two and more inches square, have been found, and a mad rush is on to the scene of the finds, the maddest it is said, in the history of the Yukon.

"Sailor Bill" Partridge was another passenger, and says he struck a mountain of gold in Atlin, a huge reef, which assays high in gold, and which has an almost unlimited supply of rock available for stamps. If the plans which Partridge intends to put before a company in London are carried out and this find develops, they will make Atlin the greatest camp known in the mining history of the world. The reef intersects Atlin City, and is two hundred to six hundred feet in width, and the average assay \$8. Partridge is on his way to London to float the scheme.

## ANOTHER STORY.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wn., June 20.—A number of Klondikers who arrived here in the steamer Dtrigo present the dark side of Klondike life. They say that Dawson is crowded with idle men who are willing to work for most any wages. Thirty-five cents an hour and board yourself is the prevailing wages for common labour. They say there are hundreds of men who have nothing but beans and bacon to eat, with no prospect of securing work, and that the only way they will be able to get out of the country will be through Government assistance.

A Charlottetown despatch of Thursday says:—The weather kept fine for the interprovincial rifle match at Kensington range, and the wind was strong and uncertain. The rain that threatened all day came just after the match was ended. A good deal of interest was taken in the day's proceeding throughout the city. A large number of citizens availed themselves of the opportunity of seeing the match and a large crowd was present. The range was visited by his Honor Lieut. Gov. McIntyre, Judge Warburton and Attorney General McDonald.

The highest individual score was 95 made by Staff Sergt. Forbes, of Richibucto, N. B. The cup was won by the P. E. team by eleven points. The visiting teams were banquetted this evening at the Davies hotel.
