THE AGRICULTURAL POLICY.

The credit of the marked development of the farming industry in the past ten years is very largely due the Local Government for their progressive agricultural policy.

Eight years ago, when the Local Government brought in legislation to assist the dairying interests by giving a bonus to every person who would start a butter or cheese factory in districts where there was sufficient milk supply to make the factory a success, there was but one establishment of the kind in the province worthy of the name.

The development of butter-making has been quite as marked, and in the year just closed the total amount of butter produced in the creameries of New Brunswick was 98,620 pounds or no less than 56,852 pounds in excess of the production for 1897.

cheese factories has been tried with success, the advantage being that the factory can be run 12 months in the year, butter being made throughout the winter for the local trade, whereas a cheese factory can only be run in the summer months.

Not content with assisting the farmers through the dairying interests, the Local Government last year announced their intention of developing wheat-raising by the distribution of seed wheat and the bonussing of flour mills in New Brunswick.

never tendered at any such price for work on the specifications called for in the New Brunswick tenders. That the Hammond River Bridge in Kings County, built by this concern had been a complete failure requiring expensive repairs every year to keep it fit for traffic.

Last of all the Premier showed that in this charge that the Province was paying the local concerns too much for its permanent bridges, there was not the slightest suspicion of wrong doing or boodling, and the fact that most of the work had been done by the Record Foundry of Moncton whose heaviest stockholders are such strong Conservative Opposition men as Senator Wood, would be proof positive that the Government was at least honest in its opinion that this was the best system under which to have the permanent bridges built and was not giving out the work to party favourites at their own prices.

This explanation will set at rest any feeling of uneasiness or distrust in relation to this bridge matter and enable the people of this Province on the 18th inst., to show their confidence in the honesty and capacity for government of the present administration.
