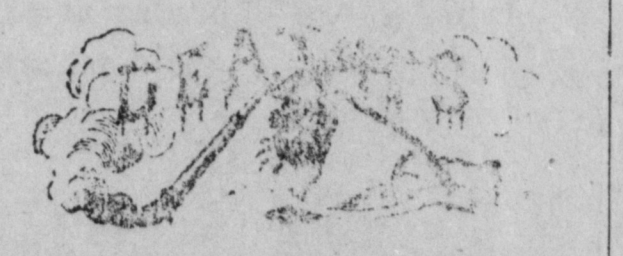

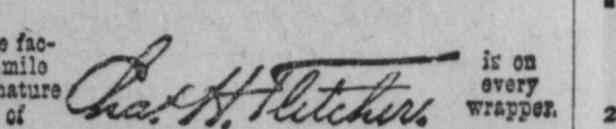

### A LETTER FROM SENATOR WARK.

We publish below a letter handed us by J. C. Brown, Esq., C. E., from Honorable Senator Wark, having a direct and important bearing on the wood supply of this county obtainable for the manufacture of pulp. In support of the correctness of the Senator's views we can state on the most reliable authority that the Senator while engaged for many years as a manufacturer and shipper of lumber, and operating an extensive water mill, must necessarily have acquired correct information as to the character of our forests in every respect, hence his opinions and views are entitled to the fullest credence and consideration. The Honorable Senator occupies the proud position of having been continually in public political life since December, 1842; first as the representative of the County of Kent in the Provincial Assembly, next for a term of years in the Legislative Council of the province, and when confederation was carried his name was inserted as a Senator in the proclamation creating confederation, which position he still retains with honor to himself and credit to the country.

FREDERICTON, 16th Dec, 1898.

Dear Mr. Brown:

I have to thank you for your welcome letter of the 16th ult., as well as for your interesting and instructive pamphlet, and am glad to learn that you have returned to Richibucto and are endeavoring to introduce a very important industry and one for which the place is so admirably adapted. There must be a great deal of capital in Richibucto, but I suppose it is already invested in different profitable branches of business and its owners might not be willing to withdraw it to invest it in any other undertaking, but if you could get some company in the United Kingdom such as the one that has made such liberal proposals to St. John to take up your project I have no doubt it would prove equally profitable to the company and the community. When I went to live in Richibucto there was a saw mill (what is called Weldon's Creek which had water to drive it a part of every season, and a dam could be constructed to contain a reserve for the driest part of the season, but if that proved insufficient a dam might be constructed on Mill Creek and a pipe laid between it and the one at the works, which would ensure an unfailing supply. I suppose the distance is not more than four miles with a favourable descent all the way. A large share of the supply of wood would at first come from the Kouchibouguais and Kouchibouguac, and if those streams were dammed or boomed above the head of the tide, it might be found that by running a branch of the railway to these points, lumber might be brought to the factory as cheaply by rail as by water and would have the advantage of carrying on the work in winter as well as summer.

I think it well worth the consideration of a Municipality that if an amount of capital now in a situation beyond its power of taxation and might continue so in all time to come, is introduced under its control bringing with it a largely increased population and giving employment to the people and paying out a large sum of money and giving a market to the farmers and merchants, whether the structure erected with that capital and the machinery employed in it should ever be taxed, especially as the increased population all contribute to the revenue and bear a part of the taxation that otherwise would fall on the rest of the population.
