### SUCCESSFUL GAME SEASON.

MAGNIFICENT TROPHIES SECURED BY HUNTERS.

(St. John Globe.)

Some idea of the worth of New Brunswick as a hunting ground for big game may be gained from the following statistics which represent in part the big game captured in our woods between September 1st and December 31st, 1898.

During these four months fifty-six moose heads were brought to Mr. J. H. Carnall, of this city, to be stuffed. These were obtained either in the Miramichi or Tobique districts, some six or eight coming from Canada. The largest moose of the season went to Mr. Fred H. Hale, M. P., of Woodstock, its antlers measuring over 60 inches across.

Captain Sears also got a magnificent head at Grand Falls, the antlers measuring very close to 60 inches. Mr. S. P. Blagden, of New York, comes next on the list with a pair of horns measuring fifty-five inches, with a blade of fourteen inches. Mr. Crockett, of Temiscouata, managed to shoot a couple of moose, besides a deer for the New York show. The antlers of the largest moose measured about fifty-six inches, while the skull weighed seventy-five pounds. The other has a fifty inch spread, but is not nearly such a fine trophy. This season, so far as the moose are concerned, has been a record breaker. The average stretch of the antlers was between thirty-six and forty-eight inches.

The past season was also a good one as far as the caribou were concerned. Mr. Carnall's books show thirty-eight caribou heads within the before-mentioned dates. The largest of them was secured by a prominent Woodstock man, and is a beautiful specimen of its kind, with thirty-eight points and a heavy spread of antlers. Captain Sears also secured a fine head. The caribou were found near Newcastle, Edmundston, Woodstock and Canada.

But moose and caribou were not the only trophies which fell to the gun during the season. Many bear, fox, wildcat and loupervier fell to the gun as well as to the trap. A decided rarity in the shape of a pair of beavers was secured by Robert Armstrong, game warden at Newcastle. They were very large specimens and will be mounted for the Crown Land office. Such was the intention when they were trapped, as they were taken in the close season. Eight black bear fell victims to the prowess of the hunter, three of these coming from Newcastle, two from Canada and two and a cub from the vicinity of Fredericton. Another rarity in the shape of a patch fox—that is a cross between a red and silver fox—was snared near the Model Farm.

Some large wild-cats have been brought in. Probably the prize specimen was brought in from Musquash, where it was trapped by Mr. Walter Dean. This also has been secured for the Crown Land office collections, and weighs between fifty and sixty pounds. While going to his traps to take this cat out Mr. Dean was attacked by its mate, which he killed with some difficulty, though it was not nearly so large an animal. The wild-cat this season was a regular pest about Musquash and it is thought by some that it would be advisable to put a bounty on them.

Mr. Carnall speaks very highly of the game wardens in office at present, and says that everyone who had been in the woods during the game season had a good word to say for them. They are all competent men and take a great interest in their work. This is due in greater measure to the efforts of the Surveyor General and the Chief Game Commissioner, who by skillful handling have transferred this service from a practically worthless one to an efficient body of officers.

Speaking of the license fees Mr. Carnall stated that in his opinion the present rate was a good one and not at all exorbitant. The men who hunted in our woods were men who could fully afford to pay what was asked, and that with few exceptions the fee was paid without any demur. It was necessary to charge a substantial fee because of the expense incurred in looking after the preservation of the big game.

Though most of Mr. Carnall's business during the past season has been concerned with the moose, caribou and deer, still he has had a number of the native game birds to stuff for various parties. The

partridge have not been so plentiful as was expected. This, Mr. Carnall attributes not to the fact that they are shot and trapped in immense quantities, but that covies are devastated by the incursions of the fox, the weasel, the owls and other depredators, all of which must be fed, and to whom the partridge are a natural prey. If these beasts and birds were thinned out we would have plenty of game birds notwithstanding the indiscriminate gunning. The game season, however, has been a record-breaking one and has netted something over \$4,000 in fees of various kinds. The prospects for the next season are bright and more sportsmen than ever are expected to hunt in the New Brunswick woods.
