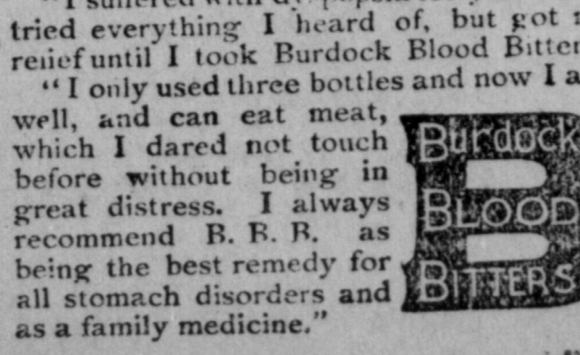

THOSE LICENSES AGAIN.

Editor of The Review.

The rate-payers not only of Richibucto Parish are growing querulous concerning the licenses illegally granted, but in all the Parishes of the County. They are awaking to the fact that the Inspector and Commissioners will grant licenses just to whom they please, irrespective of any and all provisions of the License Act. One most prominent and professional rate-payer writes "There is something bad looking in re those licenses." As a rate-payer I would respectfully ask the License Commissioners, how they could grant license to a woman, who sold her place to a Moncton man, and when the application was presented to the Board at its annual meeting at Buctouche, it was rejected most emphatically the Chairman saying he could "not entertain it at all." Also now they could do the same for a man who withdrew his application because the people where he resided would not have a saloon in the community. How also could they when they had risen as a Board, and closed their business for the year in reference to those applications, call another meeting and issue licenses, which without the regular and legal application, gazetting, public notice of meeting, so that protests could be entered was certified by the Inspector for a Prospective Year? It becomes the solemn duty of every law respecting citizen, whether he be a Temperance man or not, bring such conduct to the light, and to declare the time has come when the County should cease to be ruled by three Commissioners and an Inspector. Time surely if this be their only sense of justice to teach them something better. Time also to ask for a change of the men as well a change in the License Act, which as it now stands gives them freedom to disregard the claims of all the rate-payers who wish to see the licenses issued legally, and their provisions fully carried out. Some are asking "what financial gain is being made by such neglect by the Commissioners of the general good of the County far the interest of a few licensees?" And we may add for really some non-licensees? We hope the general indignation at such flagrant injustice will find the most practical expression, and we believe it will.
