

THOSE LICENSES AGAIN.

Editor of The Review. The rate-payers not only of Richibucto Parish are growing querulous concerning the licenses illegally granted, but in all the Parishes of the County. They are awaking to the fact that the Inspector and Commissioners will grant licenses just to whom they please, irrespective of any and all provisions of the License Act. One most prominent and professional ratepayer writes "There is something bad looking in re those licenses." As a rate-payer I would respectfully ask the License Com. missioners, how they could grant license to a woman, who sold her place to a Moncton man, and when the application was presented to the Board at its annual meeting at Buctouche, it was rejected most emphatically the Chairman saying he could "not entertain it at all." Also now they could do the same for a man who withdrew his application because the people where he resided would not have a saloon in the community.
