ATTACK ON MANILA.

MEDITATED BY GEN. AGUINALDO AND HIS
TROOPS.NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—A despatch to the
Herald from Manila via Hong Kong says:
"The situation here becomes hourly more
grave. Your correspondent visited
General Aguinaldo's outposts around
Manila on Saturday and Sunday. The
native troops seemed enthusiastic at the
idea of an attack upon Manila. On all
the houses are displayed flaming posters
bearing this inscription: 'Independence
or death.' It is said that the native
troops in the environs of Manila number
30,000. All profess great hatred for
Americans. Aguinaldo's soldiers, one
and all, are longing to attack Manila.
They declare they will accept no terms
except absolute independence. A despatch
to the Herald from Hong Kong says a
steamer which has just arrived from
Manila brings a large number of rich and
influential Filipinos and their families
who have left the Philippines owing to
the situation there."

Glass Mirrors of the Ancients.

M. Berthelot has from time to time
unearthed a vast amount of valuable in-
formation respecting the chemistry and
technology of the ancients. His latest
researches have reference to some glass
mirrors found near Rheims and which
date from the third and fourth cen-
turies. The glass was coated with a me-
tallous substance and also with a layer of
whitish material. The metal proved to be
lead, with no trace of gold, silver,
copper, tin, antimony or mercury, nor
was there any organic substance pres-
ent, showing that no extraneous mat-
ter was used to cement the lead to the
glass. The mirrors appeared to have
been cut from hollow blown glass
globes, and it is possible that before
being cut the molten lead had been
poured into the interior, adhering to
the previously warmed glass. The whit-
ish layer consisted of lead carbonate and
lead oxide formed by the oxidation of
the lead coating and calcium carbonate,
which had been deposited from the wa-
ter of the district in which the mirrors
were found.—Industries and Iron.

RAVAGED BY FIRE.

THE TOWN OF BRIDGEWATER, N. S., NEARLY
DESTROYED.HALIFAX, Jan. 12.—The town of Bridge-
water was devastated by fire early this
morning. The business portion was wiped
out. Seventy buildings were burned.
The fire started at two o'clock and burned
for seven hours. The fire originated in
Simonsen's shop, which is situated
under the Music Hall. The first alarm
was given between one and two o'clock
and very shortly the fire assumed such
vast proportions that the

were unable to cope with its great fury.
The telephone and telegraph offices were
then all closed and a messenger was des-
patched to Lunenburg for assistance. He
rode the whole way on horseback and
gave the alarm. The fire engine of that
town was speedily taken to the railway
station and at five o'clock the train pulled
out with fire apparatus and a crew of
fire fighters aboard.

BRIDGEWATER WAS SOON REACHED

but by the time Main Street was seething
with flames. The fire, stimulated by a
strong northerly wind, had gained such
headway that the firemen were powerless
to fight it. Every avenue of approach
poured forth torrents of flame. At two
o'clock the fire is still raging and firemen
fighting it at both ends. Main street is in
ruins and residences are threatened. The
loss is estimated at half a million with
\$100,000 insurance.

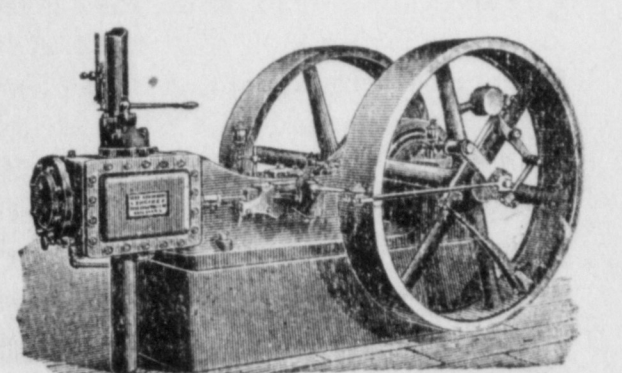

Nova Scotia, resulting in the loss of the

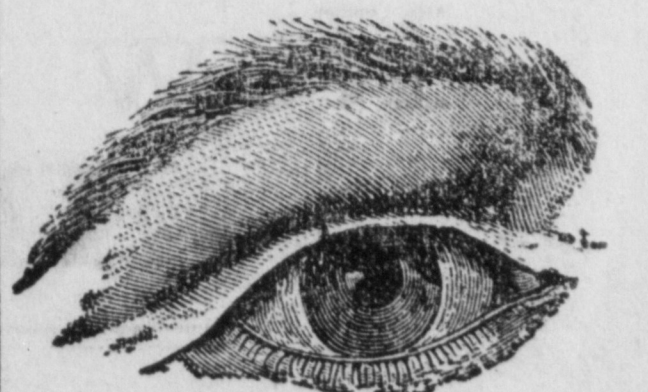

KINGSTON, KENT COUNTY, N. B.Exportation of
Live Lobsters.PUBLIC NOTICE is particularly directed to
the following Special Fishery Regulation ap-
proved by His Excellency the Governor General
in Council on the eighth day of July, 1888:
"From and after the 1st day of January, 1889,
"no one shall export or knowingly catch, buy, sell
"or have in possession for the purpose of export-
"ation, or knowingly aid or assist, directly or in-
"directly in the exporting, catching, buying, sell-
"ing or having in possession for the purpose of ex-
"portation, in or from any part of Canada, any
"live lobster or lobsters of a less size than 10
"inches in length, measuring from head to tail
"exclusive of claws or feelers."
The above regulation does not come into force
until the 1st January, 1889, but this notice is de-
signed to furnish all persons interested with
timely and ample intimation, that on and after
that date it will be rigidly enforced under the ex-
treme penalties provided by the Fisheries Act,
Chapter 95 Revised Statutes of Canada.By order,
