Mr. McGinn, of Moncton, represented the Knights of Pythias at the funeral.

A STRANGE BIGAMY STORY.

SEPARATE FOR TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AND THEN MARRIED.

CHATHAM, Ont., March 21.—Lodged in the police cells is a woman of about 45 years of age, whose name is said to be Mrs. Swanson, of Bothwell. The charge of bigamy is recorded against her, on the information of husband No. 2.

The woman's story is peculiar, to say the least. She admits that she was twice married, her first husband being a man named Huggard, with whom she lived some three years. They had one child, a daughter. This union proved a failure, for about the third anniversary they separated. For twenty-five years they lived apart. The woman had not seen Huggard, it is stated, through all these years. Meanwhile the daughter had grown to womanhood, had happily married, and with her the mother resided. Here a few months ago Swanson met the woman. Friendship ripened into love, and he proposed marriage. To this man, the prisoner states, she told the whole story of her unhappy past. This did not prevent the marriage, for they afterwards went through the ceremony.

With husband No. 2 she resided for about seven months, when a disagreement occurred and they separated. The case will probably be threshed out at the Spring Assizes next week, if the woman is sent up for trial.

—The local legislature meets to-day.

—Mr. Maglorie Robichaud of St. Charles, received severe injuries by being kicked by a horse on Monday.

—Mr. Peter McSweeney, of Moncton, has been appointed senator in place of Hon. Michael Adams, deceased.

—The Windsor hotel, New York, was destroyed by fire Friday, when over forty persons were injured, 15 of them fatally.

—The Vanstone farm on the Buctouche road was sold at auction on Tuesday, and was knocked down to Mr. W. D. Carter for \$700.00.

—400.00 in cash is to be distributed as prizes to purchasers of Union Blend Tea; a key and a card of explanation in every pound package.

—Dr. J. P. McInerney delivered a lecture in St. Peter's hall, Portland, St. John, on St. Patrick's Day, which is very highly spoken of.

—On account of the heavy snow blockade on the northern division of the I. C. R., no mails from north have reached here for several days.

—Commissioners requiring Blank forms for themselves and their Surveyors can have the same forwarded by sending to the County Secretary the number required.

—Many fishermen and others are taking advantage of the good roads the last couple of days, to haul their supplies. A very large number of teams were in town yesterday.

—Senator Poirier, of Shediac, is making arrangements to build a barrel factory. He will hereafter manufacture his own barrels to be used in connection with his flour mill.

—Mrs. Martha M. Place, who was electrocuted Monday, at Sing Sing prison, New York, for the murder of her step-daughter, was the first woman to suffer death in the chair in that state.

—Prof. J. W. Robertson, Dominion Commissioner for Agriculture and Dairying will address the Annual Meeting of the of the Farmer's and Dairymen's Association and make some important announcements as to the Policy of his Department in the Maritime Provinces.

—The heaviest snow storm of the season visited this section on Thursday. About fourteen inches of snow fell, blocking the roads in all directions. On Sunday there was another heavy fall of snow. The Kent Northern train made connections with the utmost difficulty.

—A serious smashup occurred on the Moncton and Buctouche railway on Wednesday last. The snow plow which was driven by two engines left the track and turned a complete summerset, wrecking the forward engine badly. The engineer and fireman narrowly escaped death. The road has not yet been opened up for traffic.

—The question of pork raising which is now exciting so much interest will be one of the subjects for discussion at the approaching meeting of the Farmer's and Dairymen's Association at Fredericton on the 28th, 29th and 30th, inst. Agricultural Education will also be discussed and an extended program of more than ordinary interest is being prepared.

—Four men were instantly killed in Montreal, Monday, by the fall of a scaffolding erected inside a large chimney for repairs. Men had just entered the place at the time. The killed were Louis Rochon, Henry Daley, George Discham and Archie Stewart. The fifth man, Xavier Trappier, was dug out seriously injured after being four hours under the debris.

—The Railways will all grant reduced rates to persons attending the meeting of the Farmer's and Dairymen's Association at Fredericton. It is expected that there will be enough members in attendance to secure a free return ticket. When buying the going ticket the purchaser should not forget to ask for a standard certificate. This must be filled out by the secretary at the meeting and exchanged for return ticket at the Fredericton station.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA ACT.

MONTREAL, March. 21.—La Patrie's Ottawa correspondent states that the report is current that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has confided to Edward Blake the task of introducing legislation into the Imperial commons at its present session to amend the British North American Act in the direction indicated by Sir Wilfrid in his Montreal senate reform speech.

SNOW IN GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, Mar. 21.—There has been a return of winter over the British Isles. In London there has been a heavy fall of snow, snowstorms have swept the midlands and the north country and outdoor work is at a standstill. Storms have also raged over the North Sea.

Soap-makers are trying to form a consolidation with \$75,000,000 capital. It will include all the largest manufacturers, except Armour and Swift, J. S. Kirk & Co., the N. K. Fairbank Company, Proctor & Gamble of Cincinnati and B. T. Babbit of New York are said to be in it. In all twenty-one firms are contemplated in the combination.
