As the eggs from Mrs. A.'s pultry were well-known, he had no difficulty in disposing of his stock and ran away rejoicing in his wicked little heart, over the full market price. A few days later Mrs. A. came in and was asked if it was all right about Tommy's eggs. She was in profound ignorance of the matter. Investigation divulged that the naughty boy had carefully bereft Mrs. A.'s setting hen of twelve eggs of a particularly choice breed, over which the old biddy had been sitting a fortnight. And the eggs were sold; to whom the merchant could not remember, so restitution and apologies were impossible. But now, the sequel an article usually found in Sunday School books comes in. Tommy's mother, not long after, was desecrating to a neighbour the utter "unreliability" of storekeepers in general and Tommy's action in particular. "Why," she said, "I was makin a cake, had me butter and sugar bet up and sent to the store for eggs. ## THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND.

WORK OF THE SYNOD IN SESSION AT CHATHAM.

CHATHAM, N. B., July 4.—The Lord Bishop delivered his charge at the meeting of the Anglican Synod this afternoon. Dr. Kingdom first alluded in feeling terms to those of the clergy who had died during the year. Of the late Rev. S. J. Hanford he said he was a most devoted servant of his Lord, beloved by everyone. He spoke of Archdeacon Brigstocke as follows: "He was a strong man, and, take him all in all, we shall not soon see his like again." His Lordship also spoke highly of the late Rev. W. Eatough as a painstaking and effective worker. The bishop then went on to urge the necessity for observing the Rogation days, giving historical precedents for his argument. He emphasized the need for a sound fund for incapacitated clergy and asked for a committee upon some scheme for annuities for incapacitated clergy. He also spoke strongly in asking for a sounder system of widows and orphans' fund. The conclusion of the address was a note of warning to church corporations to be careful in leasing lands and investing funds without expert advice.

On motion of Dean Partridge a vote of thanks to the Bishop was passed.

The following were appointed a nominating committee: Revs. Archdeacon Neales, Canon Forsyth, A. Bareham, H. Montgomery, Messrs. A. C. Fairweather, F. S. Sharpe, Geo. A. Schofield, T. Lee Street.

The committee on memorials brought in its report and resolutions were passed referring to the deaths of Revs. S. J. Hanford, Archdeacon Brigstocke, W. Eatough, Chief Justice Allen, W. Otty and Woolford Smith.

The report of the board of finance showed that the following investments had been made: A loan of \$8,000 at 5 per cent. to Geo. Peters, of Moncton; a loan of \$750 at 5 per cent. to Rev. L. A. Hoyt; a loan of \$5,000 at 5 per cent. to H. H. Pitts, Fredericton. Debentures were purchased to the amount of \$600. Debentures held by the Synod to the amount of \$2,900 had been paid. A piece of land near Torryburn had been sold to the Y. M. O. A. for \$25.

The board of church literature report showed the following figures: Assets, \$168,949; liabilities, \$126,121.

## HOME MISSIONS.

Mr. Geo. A. Schofield presented the report of the Board of Home Missions, which was as follows:

The following alterations have been made during the year in the grants passed by the Synod at its last session:

Addition—The amount required from the parish of Addington was reduced from \$580 to \$550. This is an increase of \$45 over the contribution for 1898.

Bathurst—The grant to Bathurst was increased \$20, as the Board learned that there is no regular cash income from the glebe, although that amount was put in the schedule for the year.

Bay du Vin—The amount required from Bay du Vin was reduced \$10 for the year in consequence of the pressure of a local debt of \$40.

Canning—The amount required from Canning was continued at \$50, as in 1898, in consequence of many difficulties at present hindering the progress of the work of the mission.

Canterbury, McAdam and Benton—A grant of \$500 has been made on condition of a contribution of \$250 from the Mission. In addition to the grant of \$500 the Board guarantee a payment of \$200 from the Robert Robinson fund.

Ludlow and Blissfield—A grant was made of \$200 to the mission of Ludlow and Blissfield on condition of the people contributing \$100. The Rev. Hugh Hooper had offered to live at Blissfield and work the mission, accepting whatever contribution the people could make. The Board felt that some grant should be made and only regretted that the funds were not on hand to make it larger. As the mission has hitherto been worked with Kingsclear the new arrangement necessitated a change in the terms of that assessment, which has been reduced to \$375.

New Denmark—The grant of \$750 to New Denmark and Grand Falls was cancelled and a grant of \$700 was made to Drummond on condition of a contribution of \$300 from the people. This change was made to enable the missionary to give a full service to the Danes, who have contributed within \$50 of the amount hitherto paid by Grand Falls and New Denmark. It has not been possible to arrange for any regular services at Grand Falls since the above alteration was made.

Richibucto—The parish of Richibucto, being unable to make up the amount required, arranged for a grant from the Colonial and Continental Church Society. The grant from the Synod has, therefore, not been drawn.

St. Martins—A reduction of \$40 was made in the contribution required from St. Martins, as the mission was without services in June, July and August, 1898, and they had been compelled to expend \$85 on the rectory.

Simonds—The amount required from Simonds was continued at \$325, as in 1898, in consequence of a loss of \$81 in annual subscriptions, and the fact that the parish was vacant for three years before the present rector was appointed.

Wicklow—The grant to Wicklow was continued at \$780, the rector claiming that the reduction usually made when a parsonage is built should not be made during his incumbency.

Grants to Divinity Students—In July last \$150 was placed at the disposal of the Bishop for the services of divinity students during the summer months.

Payments out of the funds have been made as follows: \$50 to Mr. McDona d for work in Stanley; \$50 to Mr. Gillis for work in Bay du Vin; \$50 to Mr. Hooper for work in Ludlow and Blissfield.

Outfit Grants—The following outfit grant has been made on the usual conditions: \$250 to Rev. W. B. Bellis.

Divinity Scholarships Fund—Four applications were received for grants from this fund during the year, but there was only sufficient income to enable the Board to make one of them. \$120 was granted to Mr. Clarence R. Quinn at King's College, Windsor.

Later in the year Mr. John L. Saunders, of Florenceville, repaid \$125, amount of a grant made to his son Clarence several years ago when a divinity scholar at King's College, Windsor. Ill-health compelled him to abandon his studies, and during the past year, shortly before his decease, he requested his father to return the money.

The Board having this so unexpectedly at their disposal through the generosity of Mr. Saunders made a grant of \$120 to Mr. Frederick Hazen Rigby, of St. Andrews, divinity scholar at King's College, Windsor.

Canon XXI.—The Board desire to direct attention to Canon XXI., sections 9 and 10.

9. It shall be the duty of each rector, incumbent or missionary having cure of souls in the diocese (and in case of the vacancy of any parish or cure of the church warden) to cause subscriptions to be taken in the parish or mission annually, by envelopes or otherwise, on behalf of Home Missions, and also to preach or cause to be preached annually in each church within the cure a sermon on the Home Mission work of the diocese, the collection on such occasion being devoted to Home Mission work.

10. Each rector, incumbent, or missionary (and in case of a vacancy of any parish or cure, the church warden) shall furnish the secretary of the Board on or immediately before the (20th) twentieth day of June in each year with a statement in detail of the amount of all contributions from the parish or mission for Home Mission purposes during the year, so far as the same shall have been received or pledged; and shall furnish a final statement of such contributions to the secretary on or before the thirty-first day of December, which final statement shall be accompanied by an account and payment in full of all contributions to the Synod for Home Mission purposes received during the year.

On June 20th this year statements had been received only from the following parishes: Carleton, Chatham, Dorchester, Kingsclear, Prince William, St. Mary's (St. John), Sussex and Woodstock.

The Board would ask that section 10 be again carefully considered. It is very important that some idea should be had as to the income for the year before the schedule of grants is adopted, and, of course, the canon which is in force should be obeyed. If, however, it is not found workable it had better be amended.

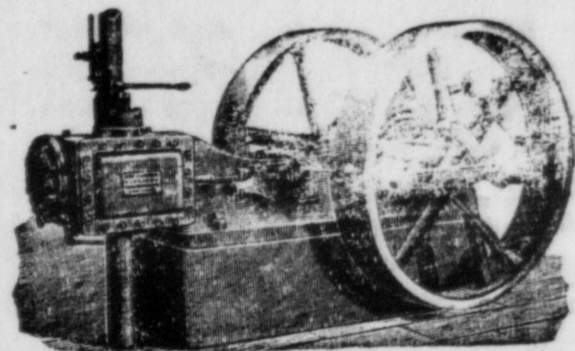
