#### DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, Apr. 5 -- In the house of commons yesterday Hon. Mr. Sifton replied to Sir Hibbert Tupper's charges against the administration of the Yukon. The speech of the minister of interior was described, not only by his political friends but by his opponents, as a masterly effort. He not only refuted every insinuation, every semiblance of charge made by Tupper but produced evidence to show that there was not the slightest stom of truth in them. Sifton was not only congratulated by all his colleagues in the cabinet and supported in the house, but many Conservatives admitted that his speech was more than an answer to Mr. Tupper, for it gave an opportunity to the minister to show the difficulties that existed in the way of governing that difficult ard almost at one time inaccessible part of Canadian territory, and, notwithstanding these, how successful the administration had been carried on. 


